California State Parks Foundation Ticket Day-Use Quail Pass

Terms and Conditions

- The California State Parks Foundation Ticket (ticket) is a one-time use item, valid only at the parks listed in this document.
- The original ticket must be presented at the entrance station in exchange for a day-use pass. Photocopies are not accepted.
- Valid for entry (parking) of one passenger vehicle with capacity of nine people or less or one motorcycle.
- Valid any day of the week, including holidays, if space is available. No priority will be given to ticket holders. State park admittance and use are subject to available space.
- Expires on the date printed on the ticket.
- Ticket holders must abide by any rules and regulations applicable to California State Parks or to the use of this item, as amended from time to time.
- Ticket holders may be required to pay separate or additional fees.

Restrictions

- Not valid at parks other than the ones listed in this document.
- Tickets are not valid for per-person entry or tour fees (such as at Hearst Simeon State Historical Monument, California State Railroad Museum, etc.), camping, boat-use fees, group use or sites, special events, oversized vehicle fees, additional/extra vehicle fees, swimming pool fees, sanitation disposal use or for supplemental fees.
- Tickets are valid unless revoked. It cannot be used in conjunction with any other pass and/or discount, nor can it be copied or altered in any way.
- Not valid for resale or commercial use, industrial or business operations, including, but not limited to, fleet use or pooling. The ticket shall not be assigned for profit and is void if misused.
- No refunds, replacements or exchanges will be made for any reason, including, but not limited to, loss, theft or environmental conditions such as low water levels, fire, park closures or inclement weather.
