Sacred Sites Memorandum Of Understanding

On December 5, 2012, the Departments of Defense, the Interior, Agriculture, and Energy, and the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation



The MOU calls for development of guidance for management and treatment of sacred sites including creation of sample tribal-agency agreements.



SUMMIT FOCUS

To build relationships among the SHPO, government agencies, and Cal THPOs and promote best practices in Section 106 to identify and protect traditional cultural properties and historic properties









This could include:

- Agreement Documents –
 CA, PA, MOA
- Guidance, Protocols,
 Toolkits
- Tribal ordinances and resolutions
- Designated Tribal Representatives
- Government to Government Relationships

ACHP regulations (36 CFR Part 800) CLARIFY Federal agencies requirements to consult with Indian tribes UNDER Section 106 of the

NHPA.



- (1) binds federal agencies to consult with tribes,
- (2) Makes it so that the SECTION 106 PROCES via 36 CFR Part 800 CANNOT BE CHANGED without an approved "program alternative"

§ 800.2 Participants in the Section 106 process

- (c) Consulting parties.
- (ii) Consultation on historic properties of significance to Indian tribes.

(D) WHEN INDIAN TRIBES ATTACH RELIGIOUS AND CULTURAL

SIGNIFICANCE TO HISTORIC PROPERTIES **OFF TRIBAL LANDS**, SECTION 101(D)(6)(B) OF THE ACT REQUIRES FEDERAL AGENCIES TO CONSULT WITH SUCH INDIAN TRIBES IN THE SECTION 106 PROCESS.

FEDERAL AGENCIES BE AWARE

HISTORIC PROPERTIES ARE LOCATED ON ANCESTRAL, ABORIGINAL, OR CEDED LANDS OF INDIAN TRIBES

CONSIDER THAT WHEN COMPLYING WITH THE PROCEDURES IN THIS PART.






Presidential Memorandum to Modernizes Federal Infrastructure Review:






Positive Train Control




Broadband
