San Juan Elementary School consists of a complex of roughly fifteen buildings, athletic fields and ancillary buildings representing at least four phases of school development on the property from circa 1920 to circa 1990. The primary cluster of classroom and administration buildings were constructed in 1964. An additional classroom building appars to date from circa 1960. A small, altered garage/utility building was possibly constructed circa 1920, and a duplex residence, constructed circa 1940. The property is also characterized by a large number of prefabricated portable buildings utilized as classrooms and offices. The original San Juan Elementary School Site is located on 5.0 Acres at the corner of El Camino Real and Spring Street. The Assessors map of 1951 shows the original 5 Acre site. The boundaries are: Spring Street on the South side, El Camino Real on the West side, including an additional 5 acres acquired by the district in 1951, for a total of 12 acres. (Exhibit 1)

There is 1 building and 1 object on the original 5 Acre site that are contribuiting properties eligible for the California Register of Historical Resources: the "Teacherage," a duplex residence built in 1947, and a 1906 school bell mounted on a stand near the school entrance. The remaining buildings include a garage/utility building dating from the 1920s, a primary cluster of classroom and administration buildings constructed in 1964, a bus garage constructed cira 1960, and several portable buildings. They are not considered contributors due to recent construction and lack of integrity.

A row of mature olive trees are located on the western property line, adjacent to Horno Creek. A large California pepper tree is located on Spring Street, probably within city right-of-way.

The San Juan Elementary School District established in 1850 was the oldest existing school district in Orange County until it was forced into unification in 1965.

In 1850 it was one of five school districts what was then Los Angeles County. The other schools were two in Los Angeles, one in El Monte and one in San Gabriel.

In the first annual report of the County Superintendant of Schools 1855-1856 it states that there was only one school in Southern Los Angeles County- the one in San Juan Capistrano .

B6. Construction History: (Construction date, alterations, and date of alterations)

The property originally belonged to the Mission and this site was the location of several adobes that were home to the people working at the Mission. In 1845, the Mission and all the properties owned by the Mission were disposed of by Pio Pico, the last of the Mexican Governors. Pio Pico sold the entire Mission properties to his brother in law John Forster (later known as Don Juan Forster) and James McKinley for \$ 710.00. The Forster Family made the Mission their home until 1865 when President Abraham Lincoln returned all Mission property back to the Catholic Church.

In 1850, while the Forster family occupied the Mission, John Forster, a well-educated man from England, saw the need for a school and donated 2.5 Acres across from the Mission on the corner of Main Street (today's El Camino Real) and Spring Street. (Exhibit 2)

The first school, located in a one room adobe (most likely a former home) that was torn down in 1871 and replaced with a 3 room building. It was a one story board and batten structure with a large front porch and an attic to accommodate the bell that was donated in 1906 by William Strohschein. (Photos # 1, 2, 3) This bell was rung to call children that lived quite a distance from the school to come to class. Today this bell is located in front of the present school building. (Photo # 4)

In 1880 an additional 2.5 acres were donated by Judge Bacon who owned property adjacent to the school to the existing 2.5 acres to accommodate the larger school building. (Exhibit 2 & 3)

In 1912, the wooden school house was relocated into downtown San Juan Capistrano and converted into a restaurant: The Palm Café. (Photo # 5) A new school was built in the Mission Revival Style. It had two bell towers and was large enough to accommodate 8 classes. (Photo # 6) In one of the bell towers hung the bell that was donated by William Stroschein in 1906. This building was in use until 1964 when it was torn down and replaced with today's Elementary School (Exhibit 4.)

In 1930, the Board of Trustees decided to purchase a school bus to accommodate school children that lived a long distance away. The bus was kept in the garage that is a small building on Spring Street .The building is original and unaltered and with the original gas pump located inside. (Photos # 7, 8, 9, 10)

In 1947, the Trustees felt it was advisable to build a Principal-Teacher Duplex that would be used by the Principal and a couple of teachers due to insufficient housing in San Juan Capistrano. This building is at 26921 Spring Street next to the Bus Garage.

The Duplex is a single story building. (Photos # 11, 12, 13) The architecture is typical of the 1940's- 4" concrete brick with the cement protruding. (Photo #14) (Exhibit 4 & 5)

In front of these buildings is an enormous, large Pepper tree (Photos #15, 16) that is well over 100 years old.

In approximately 1965, the 1906 Carl Stroschein bell, used in a bell tower attached to the 1871 school and the 1912 Mission Revival school building was relocated to a ceremonial mounting in front of the school. Although the bell has been moved from its original context, it retains California Register eligibility as a small, semi-portable object directly associated with the school property.
