The Ohlone indians were the first known people to live here. The Ohlone lives were changed by Spaniards. When the Spaniards came the Ohlone people experienced major lifestyle changes.



Young Howard Harris

Hollister Hills, as a state park, began with Howard Harris. Howard's grandpa was Jesse Whitton. Jesse toured with

Captain John C. Fremont. In 1846, on this Mountain range the Fremont Expedition raised a United States flag in defiance of Mexican rule.

Mr. Harris built many of the

park's trails. Mr. Harris used the land for mining, farming, ranching and recreation. Off-highway vehicles came here in 1947. Mr. Harris operated a motorcycle park here until 1975. In 1975 this became Hollister Hills SVRA.




