East Riverfront Site



- The 43-acre East Riverfront property is owned by the City of West Sacramento Redevelopment Agency.
- Several privately owned parcels may be added to the site in the future, potentially increasing it up to 63 acres.





Northgate Site

- The CIHC also contemplates a component at the Northgate Site, located in the City of Sacramento in the Lower American River Parkway. This site would potentially accommodate:
 - Larger outdoor gatherings with Overnight camping
 - Interpretation at a small visitor center
 - Interpretive signs
 - Shade structures
 - Maintenance storage areas












