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Next Phase of Santa Barbara Presidio Reconstruction Begins with help from Hind Foundation grant

When Complete the Northwest Corner Project will Offer Additional Museum Space for Interpretation of Presidio Neighborhood

(SANTA BARBARA, CA)—Thanks in part to a gift of \$150,000 from the Hind Foundation and support from Buy-A-Brick Campaign contributors; the last phase of the Northwest Corner Reconstruction Project at El Presidio de Santa Bárbara State Historic Park has begun. The fourth and final phase, including the construction of portions of the western and northern defense walls enclosing the northwest corner of the Presidio quadrangle, was given significant momentum from the recent Hind Foundation grant. When complete, visitors will experience an entire wing of the Presidio quadrangle, from corner

to corner, creating a sense of the size and scale of the original adobe fort marking Santa Barbara's birthplace.

The Hind Foundation grant allows SBTHP to complete ten support columns for the Presidio's 18th century defense wall from Canon Perdido Street back to the northwest corner and lay stone foundations for the entire length of the section. The columns, placed as deep as 8' 9," are a modern addition required for earthquake safety. Their locations were plotted using a combination of archaeological records and original Presidio site plans. With construction of the columns now complete, local stonemasons are making steady progress on the stone foundations which sit upon the original Presidio footprint.

The multi-phased development of the Presidio
Northwest Corner has been a continuing priority for
SBTHP. Phase one, the construction of four new
A.D.A. compliant restrooms was completed in 2005.
Phase two, including the construction of a new tworoom adobe Visitors Center and an A.D.A. compliant
access ramp at the park's Canon Perdido Street
entrance was completed in June 2006 and won the
Best Green Building Commercial Construction
Award from the Santa Barbara Contractors
Association. These rooms are currently home to
SBTHP's newest exhibit Ceramics Rediscovered.

Phase three included the reconstruction of two additional adobe rooms (soldiers quarters) originally added to the end of the west wing of the Presidio before 1797, and was completed in 2008.

As the reconstruction of the adobe buildings comprising the Northwest Corner was completed, the focus of the project shifted to the final phase which includes the reconstruction of more than 240 feet of the massive, four-foot thick and ten-foot high Presidio outer defense wall (work also includes the reconstruction of associated adobe yard walls as well as the placement of stonework on Canon Perdido Street marking the original Presidio foundation). Completing the outer defense wall will provide visitors with a never before realized sense of being inside the Presidio compound, and for the first time since the project became the focal point of SBTHP's reconstruction efforts, a physical manifestation of the fort's Northwest Corner.

With an additional 18,000 adobe bricks needed to complete the Presidio defense wall, SBTHP continues the Buy-A-Brick Campaign to raise funds for reconstruction. To date more than \$15,000 has been donated. Gifts of \$100 or more to Buy-A-Brick are honored with a certificate of recognition and acknowledged in a record on display in the Presidio Visitors' Center. The public will

also have opportunities to support the project by participating in a series of community adobe brick making sessions at El Presidio de Santa Bárbara SHP on May 15, July 31, and September 25, 2010. All adobe bricks are handmade at El Presidio from recycled earth recovered during archaeological excavations onsite. SBTHP owns and operates Casa de la Guerra, the 1820s home of Presidio Comandante José de la Guerra and his family—the restored home is now a museum featuring original furnishings and rotating exhibits.

Recently, SBTHP signed an agreement with State Parks to manage and develop the Santa Inés Mission Mills, located near the town of Solvang, as a future California State Park.
