<a href="#">Antelope Valley State Indian Museum</a>	Collection spans the material culture of California, the Great Basin & Southwest. See online: <i>A Thousand Years of Southwestern Pottery</i> Roscoe E. Hazard collection (1880-1975).	Los Angeles
<a href="#">Carpinteria State Beach</a>	Chumash sea-faring culture and sewn-plank canoe construction was remarked upon by the Spanish; explore possible connection with Polynesian technology. They were active in a wide-ranging trade network and complex economic system. Other uses for the local asphalt included water-proofing baskets; see also the natural tar seep, evidence of a later asphalt quarry, and the off-shore oil platforms.	Santa Barbara
<a href="#">Chaw'se-Indian Grinding Rock SP</a>	Sierra Miwok; bedrock mortars, petroglyphs, reconstructed ceremonial roundhouse and village. Redwood bark houses, acorn granaries, shade ramadas, and an Indian game field.	Amador
<a href="#">Ya'i Heki' Regional Indian Museum</a>	Peoples and material cultures of Southern California deserts; basketry, tools. (Lake Perris State Recreation Area)	Riverside
<a href="#">California State Indian Museum</a>	Statewide: fine collection of traditional baskets, redwood dugout canoe, hunting & fishing tools, beadwork. The ability to weave a water-tight basket reveals the sophisticated technology and plant knowledge of California Indians -- their basketry is widely regarded as one of the great textile traditions of the world. See online collections: <i>California Indian Baskets</i> and <i>California Indian Gorgets</i> (carved shell pendants).	Sacramento
<a href="#">Sumeg Village</a>	(Patrick's Point SP) Yurok; traditional North Coast village reconstructed with hand-split redwood planks and native stone by Indian community; sweat and dance houses, redwood canoe; adjacent to village site is native plant garden featuring plants used in Yurok culture.
