Dear Environmental Educator

The Conifer Connection is a guide for those who want to learn about and to teach about coniferous forests and watersheds. It is useful for classroom teachers who bring their students to the forest as well as for outdoor educators, docents, interpreters, naturalists and others.

The Conifer Connection contains in one guide:

- A review of basic ecological principles
- A review of the natural history of coniferous forests and their associated watersheds
- Information on human/cultural history of California's forests
- Suggestions for organizing field trips that are safe for kids and for the environment
- Over 40 activities and lessons for before, during, and after a trip to a forested area, as well as many more "teaching tips" to enhance student learning
- Up-to-date resources

With current budget problems, pressure to "teach to the test," liability concerns, and other issues, the opportunity for students to visit a park or outdoor education program is precious indeed. It is important that students and educators alike take full advantage of the wonderful learning opportunities afforded by a trip to a park or forest.

If you work in a program such as an outdoor school or park where teachers bring groups of students to you, I would suggest that you encourage the teachers with whom you work to obtain their own copies. The Conifer Connection can provide them with background information that will enable them to better prepare their students before participating in your program and will also enable them to do follow-up activities to reinforce what you teach them. You might suggest that they do certain activities from the guide or cover specific topics before bringing their students to your program.

If you are a classroom teacher or other youth group leader, I encourage you to use *The Conifer Connection* to increase your own knowledge so that you can take advantage of teachable moments that occur while on a trip to a forest area. It also provides a great many activities, lessons, and "teaching ideas" that will help prepare your students before a trip to a forest, learn more while in the forest, and to extend their learning after your trip.


How to Obtain Three Environmental Education Guides

These guides provide in one resource:


- A review of basic ecology




Redwood Ed (2007, 430 pages) focuses on the coast redwood forest.
