Admiral William Standley SRA #118

12/1975 - Statement of Purpose

Admiral William Standley State Recreation Area - The purpose of Admiral William Standley State Recreation Area is to make possible the public enjoyment of recreational experiences in a natural redwood-Douglas fir forest association on the banks of the South Fork Eel River near and upstream from the town of Branscomb in Mendocino County. Overnight or day use activities for recreational enjoyment by the public may be provided to the extent that there is not impairment of the natural values inherent to the site. The prime recreational values relate to the forest situation and to the South Fork Eel River.

09/1975 - Interpretive Perspectus - Division Approved

The purpose of Admiral William Standley State Recreation Area is to make available to the people forever, for their use and enjoyment, a beautiful grove of Coast Redwoods and associated plant and animal life, enhanced by the South Fork of the Eel River in the vicinity of Mud Creek in northern Mendocino County.

The function of the Department of Parks and Recreation at Admiral William Standley State Recreation Area is to manage all of the varied resources of the Park, and perpetuate them for the enjoyment of future generations.

Ahjumawi Lava Springs SP #190

The purpose of Ahjumawi Lava Springs State Park, in Shasta County, is to preserve and protect a remote and pristine area containing one of the largest systems of freshwater springs in the western United States, springs which percolate through porous lava to sustain the unit's Big Lake and Horr Pond. The unit contains extensive recent volcanic flows, with jagged surfaces, deep faults, lava tubes and cinder cones. The shoreline areas and pond islets support oak, pine and juniper forests, and the slopes support rabbit brush and sagebrush. Cultural features include prehistoric Native American rock fish traps and bedrock mortars, as well as village and ceremonial sites. The unit provides magnificent vistas of Mount Shasta, Mount Lassen, as well as other regional peaks.

California State Parks will preserve, protect, restore, interpret and manage the unit's cultural, natural, aesthetic and scenic resources, features and values, making them available to the public for their educational, inspirational and recreational benefits.

Anderson Island Natural Preserve is established to provide for the protection for public enjoyment of the natural, scenic and ecological values which exist on Anderson Island in the North Fork arm of Folsom Lake within Folsom Lake State Recreation Area. Particular attention will be given to the protection of the heron rookery which exists on the island. No overnight activities may be permitted for the public on the island. Day use activities may be accommodated to the extent that there is not damage to the natural values and especially to the heron rookery.

The function of the Department of Parks and Recreation at Annadel State Park is to manage and protect the resource values so as to assure their perpetuity, to interpret these values effectively, and to provide those other facilities consistent with the responsibility and obligations of the Department.

Every effort shall be made to provide full protection for unrestricted use of the rookery by the pinniped population. The purpose of Ano Nuevo State Reserve is (1) to preserve, protect, study and interpret the unique values of: the island seal, sea lion and bird rookeries; the fertile tidepool areas; the rocky and sandy beaches; the coastal strand and sand dunes; the bluffs and coastal terrace; and all the associated flora and fauna of the unit; and (2) to make available to the public for their inspiration, appreciation, education and enjoyment the natural values in conjunction with the cultural resources in such a manner as to wisely and prudently safeguard those natural and cultural values.

Antelope Valley CA Poppy Reserve (SR) #560

10/1978 - General Development Plan

The Antelope California Poppy Reserve is established to protect and perpetuate outstanding displays of native wildflowers, particularly the California Poppy, the State Flower, and to make these spectacular floral displays available for the enjoyment, inspiration, and education of the people for all time to come. The prime resources of the unit include both the vegetation, much of which is seasonal and disappears during the hot and dry season of the year, and the soil and the terrain on which these plants grow. The Department shall take necessary steps to manage these vegetative associations for their perpetuation and enhancement, and to make them available for as long a period of each year as is reasonably possible, within substantially natural parameters.

Interpretive programs and displays shall be undertaken to assist the public in understanding these plants and their ecological relationships, both during the blooming season and at other times of the year. Facilities for visitors shall be designed, located, and constructed so the facilities, and the visitors who use them, will have a minimum impact not only on the vegetation and the flower displays which they provide, but also on the enjoyment of these features by other visitors.

Evidences of remains of prehistoric habitations, wherever they occur within the unit, will also be protected against all kinds of damage caused by construction or visitor uses; and they shall also be interpreted to the public, for better understanding of the meaning and significance of the uses in historic times may also be perpetuated and interpreted.

03/1978 - Interpretive Perspectives - Division Approved

Antelope Valley California Poppy Reserve is established to protect and to perpetuate outstanding displays of native wildflowers, particularly and especially the California Poppy, our State flower; and to make these spectacular floral displays available for the enjoyment, inspiration and education of the people for all time. The prime resources of the unit include not only vegetation, much of which is seasonal and disappear during the hot and dry portion of the year, but soil and the terrain on which these plants grow and find their sustenance as well. The Department shall take the steps necessary to manage these vegetative associations for their perpetuation and enhancement, and, within substantially natural parameters, to make them available for as long a period each year, as is reasonably possible.

Interpretive programs and displays shall be undertaken to assist the public in understanding these plants and their ecological relationships, not only during the blooming season but during other times of the year as well. Facilities for visitors shall be designed and constructed in ways and places in order that the facilities and the visitors who use them will have a minimum impact

on both the vegetation and the flower while not distracting from the enjoyment of these features by other visitors. Included among the prime resources are also the evidences and remains of prehistoric habitations, wherever they occur within the unit. These features will also be protected against all kinds of damage, whether by construction or visitor use; and they shall also be interpreted for the public in order to provide a better understanding of the meaning and significance of the uses of these lands and resources by early inhabitants.

The purpose of the Antelope Valley Indian Museum property, in Los Angeles County, is to preserve and protect the project's historic structures, its important collections of prehistoric and ethnographic cultural materials, and the natural and scenic resources of Piute Butte. The museum building itself is an outstanding example of early twentieth century American folk architecture and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The museum's collections serve as the Regional Indian Museum for the Great Basin Indians, as well as containing materials from other cultures on other continents.

California State Parks will preserve, protect, restore, interpret and manage the property's cultural, natural and aesthetic resources, features and values, making them available to the public for their educational, inspirational and recreational benefits. Desertlands have long cast a spell on humanity. Many are the stories of people venturing far out into an uncharted desert for months or even years, only to return with wisdom and clarity. At least three of the world's great religions trace their origins to people of the desert. The spirits of the deep shadowy canyons of the Carrizo Badlands, the pinyon-clad ridges of the Santa Rosa Mountains, and the glistening heat waves of Clark Dry Lake have cast their spells on millions of visitors to Anza-Borrego Desert State Park.

Countless desert folk speak of being "addicted" to the desert realm, knowing full well the spell has been cast upon them. They know they must return to the land of warm winds, deep infinite skies, and boundless views; land which is at once subtle and harsh. Where one is bombarded by light and suffocated by heat, yet nurtured by the gentle rustling of palm fronds, and the cooling waters of a shaded pool. The spirit of the place swirls around and fills each visitor willing to let it in.

Anza-Borrego Desert State Park holds in all of its vastness and diversity, the spirit of the unknown, of exploration and adventure, of childhood fantasy, of danger and death, of respect and inner tranquility. For each visitor to the desert, there is a unique "reason" or relationship. Individually holding dear to thoughts of the desert land, seemingly unable to fully elaborate on the deep, inner workings of the relationship. "Why do you love the desert?", "How can you love the desert?", or "What do you do out there?" are questions often asked by those who have not yet fallen under the spell. Given an open mind, a kind introduction, and time, lots of time, they too may fall into a lifetime relationship with the arid land.

Anza-Borrego Desert State Park stands as a protected desert land, where the spirit of place will be held in trust forever, for its own sake, and for the sake of generations of visitors yet unborn. Whether the Park is experienced during a quiet walk through a forest of ocotillos, meditation upon a weathered boulder, a drive along a lonely road, or on a guided wildflower tour, each visitor takes in its essence in his or her own personal way, to carry forever. The Park means many things to many people, but the one constant is that, with caring and protection, the Park will be here forever, whole and preserved. The "Spirit of Place" is an elusive intangible - the goal that those of us drawn in by it continue to seek. For many of us, Anza-Borrego Desert State Park, is our Place of Spirit.

The function of the Division of Beaches and Parks at Anza-Borrego Desert State Park is so to manage the resources and values of the park as to perpetuate them for the unending benefit of the people in accordance with the purpose of the park; to interpret them fully and effectively; and to provide such facilities and services, consistent with the purpose of the park, as are necessary for the full enjoyment of the park by visitors.

07/1959 - Statement of Purpose

To preserve and maintain the natural scenic beauty and ecology of an outstanding section of the Colorado Desert region and to provide overnight and day use facilities in the area.

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Armstrong Redwoods SR #208

10/2000 - General Plan Policy Committee

The purpose of Armstrong Redwoods State Reserve, in Sonoma County, is to preserve and protect, in an essentially natural condition, the last remaining publicly owned old growth coast redwood within the county, along with the lower watershed of Fife Creek and its riparian habitat.

California State Parks will preserve, protect, restore, interpret and manage the unit's natural, cultural and aesthetic resources, features and values, making them available to the public for their educational, inspirational, and recreational benefits. The department will work cooperatively with other entities to further these objectives.

12/1975 - Statement of Purpose

Armstrong Redwoods State Reserve is established to provide for the protection and perpetuation for public use and enjoyment of the outstanding virgin redwood forest which is growing in the lower basin of Fife Creek in Sonoma County near the confluence of Fife Creek with its west branch, and including the watershed of Fife Creek. The presentation of the redwood forest for public enjoyment in an essentially natural condition is the prime objective. Daytime visitor facilities which are necessary to permit the public to enjoy the redwood forest are desirable. Cultural values occurring within the park will be protected and interpreted.

01/1974 - Interpretive Perspectives - Proposal Only

The purpose of Armstrong Redwoods State Reserve is to make available to the people, for their inspiration and enjoyment forever, a segment of scenic Sonoma County. Redwood forests, in the vicinity of the town of Guerneville and the Russian River embracing small creeks, wooded slopes and canyons and draws thick with vegetation attendant to the natural growth of a coastal redwood forest, together with all the scenic, historical, scientific, and recreational resources of the area.

The function of the Department of Parks and Recreation at Armstrong Redwoods State Reserve is to preserve, maintain, and interpret the resources and values of the park, and to provide facilities and services for the public, consistent with the declared purpose of the unit.

07/1959 - Statement of Purpose

To provide overnight and day use facilities and to preserve 440 acres of excellent redwood forest.

07/1959 - Statement of Purpose

(for Arroyo Burro Beach State Park) To make available for day use 600 feet of ocean frontage in a pleasant cove with six and one-half acres of supporting upland.

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Arthur B. Ripley Desert Woodland SP #595

07/2000 - General Plan Policy Committee

The purpose of the Arthur B. Ripley Desert Woodland State Park, in Los Angeles County, is to preserve and protect an impressive area of Joshua Tree - juniper woodlands and its associated ecosystem, a landscape which was once abundant in the Antelope Valley.

California State Parks will preserve, protect, restore, interpret and manage the unit's natural scientific, aesthetic and scenic resources, features and values, making them available to the public for their educational, inspirational and recreational benefits.

01/2004 - Spirit of Place Statement

The coastal dunes vegetation community will continue its recovery and the conference facilities will continue to operate in a manner that maintains its unique spirit of place as "a refuge by the sea."

01/2004 - Statement of Purpose

Asilomar State Beach and Conference Grounds is established to protect and perpetuate and to make available to the people of California, the spectacularly beautiful coastline, dunes, and coastal forests of the Monterey Peninsula; the architecture of Julia Morgan and others, both within and outside of the historic campus core; and the social history of the original development of Asilomar and its continuation in the conference grounds theme and function.

The California Department of Parks and Recreation shall define and execute a program of management to perpetuate and preserve the unit's declared values, and provide facilities and interpretation that makes these values available in a manner consistent with their perpetuation.

04/1988 - General Plan

The purpose of the former Atascadero State Beach is to make available to the people, for their benefit and enjoyment, the scenic, natural, cultural, and recreational resources of the ocean beach and adjacent uplands.

The function of the California Department of Parks and Recreation at the former Atascadero State Beach shall be to preserve and protect public opportunities for ocean beach-oriented recreation in a high-quality environment, and to restore and protect the natural values of the coastal dunes. A natural setting for recreational activities shall be preserved.

12/1975 - Statement of Purpose

The purpose for Atascadero State Beach is to make possible the public use of the sandy ocean beach in the area immediately upcoast from Morro Rock in San Luis Obispo County. The emphasis on public use will be an optimum public enjoyment of the ocean and ocean beach recreational resources. Only those developments may be undertaken which do not impair the utility of the ocean beach for recreational purposes or which do not impair the public enjoyment of the scenic and recreational qualities of the ocean beach and the ocean at this location.

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Auburn SRA #398

09/1979 - General Plan

The purpose of the Folsom Lake State Recreation Area and the Auburn unit is to make available to the people the great recreational opportunities afforded by, and in relation to, the reservoirs impounded behind Folsom, Nimbus, and Auburn dams on the American River, including aquatic features, environmental amenities, and the historic values or the localities; and to interpret these resources to the people.

To prevent the loss of historical information about the heritage and cultural development of California. 3. To prevent the loss of anthropological and archeological data.

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Austin Creek SRA #245

10/2000 - General Plan Policy Committee

The purpose of Austin Creek State Reserve, in Sonoma County, is to preserve and protect a remote and little-touched segment of the scenic Coast Range. This area features attractive landscapes of round, grassy slopes, draws and canyons thick with vegetation, as well as valuable riparian ecosystems in the watersheds of Upper Fife Creek and the East Fork of Austin Creek. The unit contains rare plants and plant communities dependent upon serpentine soils.

California State Parks will preserve, protect, restore, interpret and manage the unit's natural, cultural and aesthetic resources and values, making them available to the public for their educational, inspirational, and recreational benefits.

The purpose of Austin Creek State Recreation Area is to make available to the people, for their inspiration and enjoyment forever, a segment of scenic Sonoma County Coast Range in the vicinity of the town of Guerneville and the Russian River, embracing small creeks; round, grassy slopes; canyons and draws thick with vegetation and rugged outcrops of rock; together with all the scenic, historical, scientific and recreational resources of the area.

The function of the Department of Parks and Recreation at Austin Creek State Recreation Area is to provide for recreational opportunities; to preserve and protect the scenic values of the area; and to provide such facilities and public services consistent with the purpose of the unit as may be necessary for the full enjoyment of the unit by visitors.

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Avila SB #453

12/1975 - Statement of Purpose

Avila State Beach is established to make possible the public use and enjoyment of the sandy ocean beach in the vicinity of the City of Avila in San Luis Obispo County. Beach recreational activities which are consistent with the public enjoyment of the sandy beach and of the ocean at this location are appropriate. No developments should be undertaken which will impair the optimum public use and enjoyment of the beach and the ocean resources.

California State Parks will preserve, protect, restore, interpret and manage the unit's natural, scientific and aesthetic resources, features and values, making them available to the public for their educational, inspirational and recreational benefits.

12/1975 - Statement of Purpose

The purpose of Azalea State Reserve is to provide for the perpetuation for public enjoyment in an essentially natural condition of the stands of western azalea which occur on both sides of Azalea Road near its junction with State Highway 200 in Humboldt County. The purpose of Benicia State Recreation Area is to make available to the people for their enjoyment the scenic area surrounding and including Southampton Bay and Dillon Point on the north shore of Carquinez Strait, and the outstanding natural values of the wetland area of Southampton Bay.

Castle Rock State Parklands are a diverse mix of natural features that include most of the remnant ecosystem types of the Santa Cruz Mountains. Although substantially altered since the arrival of Euro-Americans, the recovering park lands provide a glimpse of the original primeval character of the Santa Cruz Mountains. One can gaze from the ridgetops along Highway 9 and Skyline Boulevard or hike over a landscape of steep, densely vegetated canyons, dense redwood and mixed evergreen forests, oak woodlands, and open grasslands. Many of the ridges are embellished with sandstone rock outcrops that include very rare tafoni formations. On clear days the outstanding scenic views extend south to Monterey Bay and beyond. To the west nearly the entire length of forested Ben Lomond Mountain is discernible. A portion of Big Basin Redwoods State Park is visible in the near distance. To the north grassland covered ridges and steep, forested canyons extend to the horizon. The ecological linkage between Castle Rock State Park and other natural areas of the Santa Cruz Mountains is apparent. Little evidence of human occupation is visible from the park.

Along park trails one can view cascading streams and luxuriant vegetation. In the spring wildflowers are abundant in the grasslands and oak savannahs of the park. Near Partridge Farm are numerous large, old live and black oak trees. A short distance away are large rock outcrops where experienced climbers can enjoy a view of the San Lorenzo Valley and Monterey Bay. Not as readily seen, the fortunate visitor may encounter some of the larger mammals of the park, such as deer and bobcat. On warm days it is not uncommon to see turkey vultures cruising overhead on thermals in search of food.

On clear, moonless nights at Castle Rock celestial bodies adorn the sky owing to the lack of light pollution sources so common in the metropolitan areas of the Santa Clara Valley to the

east. For those who have the opportunity, the peacefulness of such an experience contrasts sharply to the urban environment below. The overall impression of the park for many visitors is a place of peace, tranquility, beauty, and experience far removed from the pressures of the modern world. (pages 2, 3)

The park interior is enveloped by its ridgelines, and one perceives the land as being secluded, protected and still. Without city noises and visual obtrusions, visitors become aware of the park's subtle movements, natural smells, and variations in microclimate, vegetation, and topography. Many endearing values of the park are intangible. The qualities of open space, natural sounds, and fresh air cannot be quantified like physical resources can, but they allow visitors to be aware of and reconnected with the natural world.

The forces of nature that have shaped the land are evident by the steeply cut valleys, landslides, and rolling hills of the parks. These places mark the passage of time through their variation of seasonal colors. The park's landscape changes over the course of a year from one that is dry and dusty to one that is moist and lush. These variations can also be discovered while moving through the various park environments. South facing slopes can appear dry and exposed, while a short distance away, a riparian woodland can provide water and dense shade.

The park is one of few in the Los Angeles Basin that offers opportunities for tranquility, solitude, and relief from the hectic urban life that surrounds it. It gives visitors a place to explore and recreate at their leisure. As the pace of life in this area quickens and the size of the population adjacent to the park grows, these values will become increasingly precious to many park visitors.

One comes away from Chino Hills State Park feeling refreshed. But the effect of one's experience at the park is most apparent when one returns to the urban environment. The park

09/1978 - Resource Element or Resource Management Plan

The purpose of El Pueblo de Los Angeles State Historic Park is to preserve and, where appropriate, restore and reconstruct for the enlightenment and enjoyment of the public forever, the remaining features of one of the three official Spanish pueblos of Alta California, as well as structures and other features characteristic of the flow of history and diverse populations associated with the development of the Pueblo and the City of Los Angeles. Emphasis will be on the span from the Spanish Era through the Mexican and American Eras 1818 - 1932.

07/1959 - Statement of Purpose

(Pueblo de Los Angeles State Historical Monument) To preserve for display and to perpetuate the birthplace of the City of Los Angeles.

The purpose of Ellen Browning Scripps Natural Preserve is to protect and perpetuate the area's prime resource values. These values are: 1) the Torrey pine and its supportive native plant community, 2) state and federally listed rare, endangered, and threatened plants and animals, 3) evidence of Native American occupation, 4) plants and animals designated by the department as species of special interest, and 5) exposed geologic sequences.

The long-range objectives of the department shall be to manage the prime resource values in such a manner that the ecological processes function as closely as feasible to what they would have without modern mankind's influence. This management may involve purposeful resource manipulation to negate or minimize past or future impact by people.

Appropriate visitor use of the unit includes only those activities which allow for and encourage enjoyment of the prime resource values and do not detract from or degrade from these features, so that future generations shall have the same experiences and opportunities.

Note: The general plan (page 31) indicates that this declaration of purpose is an improvement over an early declaration prepared by the staff "in the mid-1960s" but not taken to the Commission. The text of this earlier declaration is provided and is as follows:

Within Torrey Pines State Reserve there is established the Torrey Pines Natural Preserve, embracing the natural forest of Torrey pines which exist south of Los Penasquitos Marsh on the uplands between the marsh and the ocean. The purpose of the natural preserve is to provide the fullest measure of protection and perpetuation by management that can be achieved in relation to this only significant Torrey pine forest in the world. Only those public uses which can be accommodated without the slightest shadow of threat to the ecological integrity of the Torrey pines will be permitted. The entire flow of history must be considered in order to tell the complete story of hard-rock gold mining at Empire Mine. However, a prime period will be emphasized.

The prime period will be from 1877, the approximate date of William Bourn, Jr.'s interest in the mine, until 1942, when gold mining was halted for the duration as non-essential to the war effort. - A Zone of Primary Cultural Interest has been identified that is associated with resources of prime significance. The Zone of Primary Cultural Interest is an area in which complete historical integrity and authenticity are sought. At Empire Mine State Historic park, the zone encompasses the portion of the south parcel that lies between East Empire Street and the section line that runs east to west across Osborn Hill, as well as the immediate area of the Rowe headframe and ore bins. (See Proposed Land Use Map.) It contains the Empire Mine industrial complex and the Empire Cottage residential complex.

Regional trail connections and other unique regional recreation opportunities will be enhanced and established. Opportunities for partnerships, interpretation, and research will be encouraged, including cooperation with regional educational institutions and Monterey Bay area jurisdictions.

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Fort Ord Dunes SP #476

The purpose of Fort Ord Dunes State Park is to perpetuate forever, for public use, inspiration, esthetic enjoyment, and education, an area along the central California Coast of unique natural beauty and scientific significance including sandy beaches and coastal dunes. All scenic, natural, cultural and recreational resources shall be managed as a whole, preserving and restoring the natural character of the park in accordance with ecological principles.

Fort Ord Dunes State Park is an area of contrasts. It is seen by millions of people as they drive by on State highway One, but it has been closed to the public for decades. The land is open and relatively undeveloped, yet the past development of the land for small arms training has significantly altered the landscape. The Army deserves credit for preserving the open space character of the land, yet they used the land for the most utilitarian purposes including sewage treatment and storm water disposal. The beaches and bluffs are pounded by the full force of the Pacific Ocean, yet they are composed of tiny grains of unconsolidated sand. The vegetation is dominated by African ice plant, yet the area is highly valued for its habitat value for endangered species. The area is revered for its beauty, but the site includes over 100 abandoned buildings.

Much of the beauty of the park is in its potential. There is a commonly shared vision that the park can become an area of outstanding environmental quality, available for all to enjoy. Just imagine the opportunity this park represents. Four miles of undeveloped coastline in view of the Monterey Peninsula, one of the most popular tourist destinations in the world, adjacent to the nation's (sic) largest National Marine Sanctuary, and the largest component of California's newest State Seashore. Exotic plants, abandoned buildings, and contaminated soil are not problems we should dread to face but challenges we are anxious to tackle and overcome. The establishment of Fort Ord State Park (sic) represents the public's commitment to the environment, to our quality of life, and to our faith in ourselves and the future.

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The goal of the Department of Parks and Recreation is to facilitate the transformation of the potential and the vision into reality. Working with the public, the Army, the universities, local jurisdictions and other public and private organizations, we will restore habitat, recreate the natural landscape, provide public access, and develop appropriate day use and overnight facilities. By recreating an outstanding natural environment available to the public, Fort Ord Dunes State Park will enhance the quality of life for the people of California and add to the values that attract visitors from around the world to the Monterey Bay area.

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Fort Ross SHP #207

11/1975 - General Development Plan

The purpose of Fort Ross State Historic Park is to enable modern Californians to know, enjoy, and understand the Russian adventure in California. The visitor's experience should center on his better comprehension of the role of Russia in California's exploration and settlement. The interpretive objectives at Fort Ross State Historic Park are to be a presentation of Fort Ross' rise in Russian fur trade imperialism and its affect on the local situation in terms of the Indians and Spanish/Mexicans, and ultimately on modern American society.

The primary theme of Fort Ross State Historic Park centers on Russian political and economic affairs during this era with special concern for relationships with Spain and Mexico. As background to this major theme, consideration will be given to Russian international affairs generally, colonization, territorial expansion, economic and material growth, and the development of agriculture. Russian religious affairs and multi-ethnic relations will also be included. The secondary themes will include the Indian history and the effect of European contact on their development up to recent times and will include the American Era, stressing the economic, agricultural, shipping, and ranching activities. The period of time covered will be the time of Russian occupation (1812 - 1841), especially the last eleven years of the colony when it was at its height. Due consideration will be given to the American Era in the flow of history, particularly the American ranching activities. Although Fort Ross is an historical unit of the State park System, it has tremendous natural and scenic value as well. In addition to the common species of plants and animals associated with the north coastal prairie, coastal sage scrub, redwood forest, and mixed evergreen forest biotic communities, two rare and endangered plant species (*Chorizanthe valida* and *Dichondra donnelliana*) are found here, and the brown pelican, an endangered bird, may be seen flying along the coast during the winter. Many interesting geologic features can be observed in the park, including part of the San Andreas Fault zone. The fault has drastically changed the course of Fort Ross Creek and modified the growth configurations of trees along its course. These natural resources and the outstanding views of mountains, coast, and ocean will enhance the visitor's experience at the state historic unit; also, their preservation is essential to the primary historical purpose of the unit inasmuch as the historical values are to be presented in their original, natural setting to the fullest extent possible.

The primary cultural resources consist of the archeological remains of the Pomo Indians, the Russian people and Aleuts; and, the reconstructed buildings and walls. Secondary cultural resources are the American Era buildings and associated materials.

The Zone of Primary Cultural Interest is the area of Fort Ross itself and the village structures around the fort, as well as certain outlying locales. These outlying locations include the

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workshop area in the ravine to the east of the fort, the Russian cemetery, the rock pattern area in the grove of trees west of the fort, the warehouse area east of the ravine, and the remains of the Russian Road.

08/1975 - Resource Management Plan

The following is a listing of themes as presented in the California History Plan which pertain to Fort Ross. The primary theme of Fort Ross. The primary theme of Fort Ross State Historic Park relates to the History Plan and centers on Russian coastal, political, and religious affairs with special concern for relationships with Spain and Mexico. Russian international affairs generally, colonization, territorial expansion, economic and material growth, and the development of agriculture are important thematic expressions.

The unit's sub-themes relate to the American and Indian eras. Economic and material growth, agriculture, and water transportation are important themes for the American Era, while recent California Indians and changes due to European contact are important to the Indian Era.

Regarding the Flow of History, the general concern is the period from the ethnographic Pomo Indians through the Russian occupation to the American Era with the prime emphasis of the American Era being on the Call ranching activities.

Within this history flow, the prime period is in reference to the 1812 to 1841 Russian occupation with 1830 to 1841 being the prime emphasis. This is regarded as the most important time span for the unit, for the historic unit is statutorily named for the Russian occupation and 1830 to 1841 is believed to represent the period of maximum expression of the Russian occupation.

The prime cultural resources consists of the archeological remains of the Pomo Indians and Russian people in the area of the unit and the reconstructed buildings and walls. Secondary cultural resources are the Call Ranch buildings and associated materials.

Although Fort Ross is an Historical Unit of the State Park System it has tremendous natural and scenic resource values as well. In addition to the common and widespread species of plants and animals associated with the north Coastal Prairie, coastal Sage Scrub, Redwood Forest, and Mixed Evergreen Forest, biotic communities, two rare and endangered plant (*Chorizan valida* and *Dichondra donnelliana*) exist in the unit; while the brown pelican, and endangered bird, may be seen flying along the coast during winter. Many interesting geologic features can be observed in the unit including part of the San Andreas fault zone, which has drastically changed the course of Fort Ross Creek and modified the growth configurations of trees near the fault. Views of mountains, coast, and ocean are of outstanding scenic quality.

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The Zone of Primary Cultural Interest includes the area of Fort Ross itself, the area of village structures around the Fort, the workshop area along the shore area in the gulch to the east of the Fort, the Russian cemetery, and related areas to this zone, like the rock pattern area in the grove of trees to the west of the Fort and warehouse area to the east of the gulch (cf. Fort Ross aerial photograph with cultural manifestations indicated in the Interpretive planning Unit's files, Design and Construction Division, Department of Parks and Recreation), all as shown on the attached map. No resources that are not either Russian or directly related to Russian resources relative to the prime period can be maintained in this zone.

The public purpose for Fort Ross State Historic Park is to enable modern Californians to know, enjoy, and understand the Russian adventure in California. The visitor's experience should center on his better comprehension of the role of Russia in California's exploration and settlement. The interpretive objectives at Fort Ross State Historic Park are to be a presentation of Fort Ross' role in Russian fur trade imperialism and its affect on the local situation in terms of the Indians and Spanish/Mexicans, and ultimately on modern American society.

It is not inappropriate, in relation to the flow of history, to indicate the character of the post-Russian period, especially in terms of how the period came about relative to the Russian occupation in Alta California.

To reconstruct, display and interpret for public enjoyment and education the major site of the most southerly Russian occupation of the North American continent.

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Fort Tejon SHP #351

The purpose of Fort Tejon State Historic Park is to make available to the people the site of the military post, Fort Tejon, by preserving, restoring, and replicating its historical facilities and environment, and interpreting its significance to the Euro-American colonization of California.

Past and present, the spirit of Greenwood State Beach is linked inextricably with the community of Greenwood - a relationship of mutual interdependence. Greenwood grew up as a doghold port, a company town centered around the lumber mill facilities on the coastal terrace and in Greenwood Cove below it. It owes its existence to the fortuitous circumstances of the juncture of the creek and ocean and the proximity to rich redwood resources.

Yet as much as this relationship is a symbiotic one, it is also one of contrast and change. This place was once a bustling, lively scene of people, activity, noise and movement. But when the last mill finally shut down, structures were demolished and the stockpile of timber logs and cut lumber disappeared. The buzz of the saw, the shouts of men, the clamor of mules and wagons, the whir of winches and cables have been replaced by the faint sighing of wind across the open plateau, the whizz of a fast-moving automobile on the highway. Water, wind, and time have restored the natural character of the beach and cliffs. Ecological processes have reasserted themselves on the terrace; today, remnants of foundations and land alterations are barely discernible through the brushy covering of vegetation that has taken hold. This is a place that speaks of change: the power of nature to regenerate itself, of life and how nothing stays the same.

Greenwood State Beach presents a series of dual natures and contrasts, beginning with that between the architectural quality and rural village character of the town and the character of the park - a rough natural space set in its midst. Within the park, from the historic post office anchoring the northern edge of the coastal terrace down into Greenwood Cove, the park progresses from a structured man-made environment to one increasingly unstructured and natural. The coastal terrace, an open, exposed and somewhat barren landscape, contrasts with

the enclosed one of the cove. The old lumber road is the physical transition between them, providing the visitor with a unique journey between these two environments. The steep descent takes the visitor from the point of view of the observer, high above the sea and the beach, down into an intimate natural world where the sights and sounds and smells of the creek and surf and sea inundate the senses. From flat and open to curved and enclosed, from nearly barren to thickly vegetated. From the quiet spaciousness of empty sky to the encompassing sounds of earth and water. The park is both quiet and busy, windy and still, cool liquid and hot, dry earth, clear, bright sun and damp, misty fog, steep vertical slopes and flat horizontal planes, close and far away.

The one constant relationship between place and town has been the inconstant sea, exerting its magnetism on all who come within its province, drawing them to the shore, the meeting of land and water. At Greenwood State Beach, a backdrop of steep cliffs surrounds a small pocket beach like open arms, extending into the horizon and framing a view of the sea and sky dominated by the looming central presence of Gunderson Rock. From the east, Greenwood Creek passes through dark banks blanketed in a thicket of dense riparian growth. Reaching open ground, the water widens and slows into quiet ripples in its gentle progression across the sandy beach towards the sea. Here the ocean's wet tongue licks at the sandy fringe, nibbles at the land and offshore seastacks, on occasion taking great chunks from the cliffs. The sound of water - the crashing of waves on rock, the spew of foam, the soft susurrations of waves drawn back into the ocean across the sandy carpet - competes with the sounds of gulls and other birds. Man's ageless perception of its magnetism is expressed in the words of Rachel Carson: "Like the sea itself, the shore fascinates us who return to it, the place of our dim ancestral beginnings. In the recurrent rhythms of tides and surf and in the varied life of the tide line there is the obvious attraction of movement and change and beauty. There is also, I am convinced, a deeper fascination born of inner meaning and significance."

These distinctive areas present different challenges in planning for the future of this land as a unit of the State Park System. The magnetism of the sea attracts people for recreation, leisure, and solitude, and a great challenge will involve protection and preservation of the park's natural and historic resource values while on the same hand providing for statewide access, use and enjoyment of them. On the coastal terrace, an additional challenge is accomplishing that in a way that enhances this area's spirit of place as a contrasting complement to the town. The park cannot turn its back on the community - successful operation of Greenwood State Beach will depend on the park remaining an integral and vital component of the community, of finding a harmony between statewide use and local community character and desires. An understanding of erosion problems and the differences of soils and their erodibility is also needed. The San Andreas Fault, which is a major feature of the area, will also be a primary interpretive subject, interesting to many of the visitors. Most natural, historical, and archeological features are considered to be secondary, and must be interpreted in proper perspective with the vehicle uses.

The management and public use of the prime resources will be done in such a manner as to satisfy the needs of off-road vehicle enthusiasts, consistent with the protection objectives that must be achieved if the area is to continue to meet its vehicular use objectives. Other resources, including both cultural and recreational, that are deemed interesting, unique, or important will be protected and preserved for visitors to enjoy. These resources will be featured as prime attractions only in relation to OHV uses.

A misty veil.

Silky webs support the glistening dew.

Splintered shafts of light pierce the shadowed forest floor.

Two thousand-year-old living monuments of nature tower mightily over verdant carpets of redwood sorrel and ferns.

Deer graze warily at a meadow's edge, a mountain lion watches, a hawk feasts upon a squirrel's missed vigilance, a banana slug's glistening trail marks its silent passage.

Rain cascades downward, collecting, merging, gorging itself on grains of sand and ancient stones, its collective power swelling into a powerful, carving torrent.

Humboldt Redwoods State Park embraces a landscape of contrasts. Quiet, sunny meadows serve as entryways into the shadowed world beneath a 300-foot tall, light-absorbing canopy of green. Rivers that ensure life for migrating steelhead and salmon can be the demise of age-old giant redwoods, while carving deeply into mountains, scattering their ancient sediments miles downstream.

Roadways slip past ancient redwoods, quickly whisking passersby and their accompanying noise through the park. Beyond these sounds, the hush of centuries masks the bustle of the modern world, and the backcountry silence is broken only by the quiet, soothing sounds of nature. Listen carefully and hear a migrating steelhead breaking the water's surface; the squawk of a Steller's jay drawing attention to the ongoing life that has thrived here unmolested and little-changed.

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For thousands of years, humanity's footsteps trod lightly upon this ancient land, but for the past two centuries the passage of human footprints has multiplied ever more quickly, creating two distinct trails; the first of profound change and the latter of revered preservation. It is the former trail that we acknowledge and for which we must assume responsibility. It is the latter trail that gives us hope that humanity's footsteps can continue among these great redwoods, not as opportunistic visitors, but as proud stewards of our natural heritage.

The primeval redwood forests that nature slowly removed from throughout most of the world's temperate climatic zones over millions of years, human hands have nearly eliminated from the earth in two short centuries. Today, ancient coast redwoods inhabit only small, vestige pockets of their original eighteenth century world. Humboldt Redwoods State Park preserves and protects that which nature has determined is worthy of survival and that which escaped the axes and saws of earlier generations. For us, the second and latter trail, that of revered preservation, indeed offers its own rewards, but not of a monetary nature. Instead, we depart our short vistas to this park where we stood and wandered among these giants with an inspiration previously unknown and with a more complete understanding of our pivotal role in nature.

The park is a mosaic of towering ancient and second growth redwood forests, prairies, and shrublands, largely untouched by humans. It stretches from canyon bottoms to ridge tops and is bisected by cool, clear streams, which support a host of aquatic life, with native fish returning to spawn in great numbers.

Natural processes and resource management promote healthy ecosystems, thereby providing habitats that support a wealth of both frequently occurring and rare species of flora and fauna. Native American sites and historic remains of regional significance are also recognized features for park protection.

As the largest remaining free-flowing river in California, and one of the purest, the Smith River constitutes a park feature of exceptional significance for the six miles that it flows in or along the park. The department shall use its full influence in appropriate ways to protect the purity of the river, and to bring about full protection of the upper watershed of Mill Creek, which flows through the park's primary redwood forest.

U. S. Highway 199 presently passes through the heart of the park, carrying not only tourists but heavy commercial traffic as well, with numerous undesirable impacts on the experience of park visitors. A bypass route for this highway has already been adopted; and it is a major objective of the Department to facilitate the removal of major highway traffic impacts from the center of the park. It is the intent of this plan to keep the existing Highway 199 open for public use.

At first appearance, Leo Carrillo State Beach is composed of the simple, basic elements of sky, water, and land - all colored in whatever the lighting, the hours, and the season work out. Lisiqshi, a village of the Chumash, once looked out at it all from its prehistoric site on a grassy knoll. The Chumash voices are silent now, long carried off by the winds coming off the water. Only the land remembers their sound. The land that was here before their time and ours knows all the spirits of this place, but it speaks a language we struggle to understand.

It is not because we do not try.

"We probe its soil mantle for secrets belonging to the passage of time.

We ask, 'How old are your geologic bones?' and are told, 'Very old, tens of millions of years, at least.'

We try to map its folds and crevices, and decipher its fault lines and the codes of minerals locked in stone.

"We kick up a fist-sized fossil, the likeness of an ancient sea creature sculpted in pale stone. It is identified as a rather common relic of long-ago life forms.

We attempt to map the intricate designs and patterns woven into its vegetative cover, a magical cloth that regenerates itself and gives life to others.

We end up with a fist full of lists, species, classification systems.

"We trace the waters that course through the hills, and follow their lines home to the sea.

We qualify and analyze into constituent parts, shrouding the mysterious intimacy of the water's movements through the land, sometimes passing us in secret darkness below.

We claim the floodplain shaped by its hand, and force its sinuous movements into the course of

our convenience.

We hold it there with tons of stone, but now the layers of fertile sediments stop building up, and the young trees do not get born.

"The land in its wisdom realizes,
We know much and understand little."

The land rises from the waters of the Pacific, first into sea cliffs and terraces, and soon thereafter into the massive, rounded forms of the Santa Monica Mountains. Two well-travelled highways slice through the landscape, meeting very near where the waters of Arroyo Sequit join the Pacific Ocean. Pacific Coast Highway, or PCH as it is most often called, is now classic old beach route well settled into its coastal shelf. Mulholland Highway winds and drops along one side of Arroyo Sequit Canyon, its rather dramatic journey terminating at a simple stop sign. To the thousands who drive along these travel corridors each day, the undeveloped coastal and mountain scenery relieves, for a few moments, the urban intensity of life outside these boundaries. Approaching Sequit Point from downcoast, there is a certain drama in finally having that perfectly framed windshield view of nothing but sun-bleached mountainside, ocean, and sky.

The character of this place is experienced in a special way by those who travel through in vehicles. Impressions are of a land-to-the-seascape, freeze-framed at a certain time of the year, at a certain time of the day. The interplay of light on the water, the atmospheric qualities on the horizon, and the seasonal hue of the hillsides have characteristic patterns of movement and change, but to someone driving through, they are abstract, silent, and relative motionless.

All of this changes down by the water. Here too, the scenery is composed of very basic elements: sky, sand, and water, with a simple backdrop of sea cliffs and mountains. But here the experience is multisensory, and the ocean dominates. It fills the air with its sound and scent and ceaseless movement. The scale and level of detail change near the water. The fine, sandy texture of the beach is broken by the rough course of dark cobbles scattered into the lower intertidal zone. In this rocky landscape, the whole intricate world of tidepool life reveals its tiny movements and patterns, protected, as it is, by the landmark promontory of Sequit Point. The coastal bluffs are rubbed smooth from constant exposure to the elements, and foot-worn paths come down the bluff faces to the sand below. Beach-goers find their way to all the access points, take up places along the shore, and transform the sand with their brilliant colors, sounds, and activities of the beach culture. Surfers bob out on the water as comfortable in their environment as any marine species, and divers ready their gear, heading for the underwater world of the kelp forest where sounds, colors, and sensations are radically different from terrestrial life.

A kayaker mentioned once that when he paddles down along the coast following the old Chumash routes, the Arroyo Sequit landscape stands out. "It is still really beautiful," he says, "and I know that I, too, would have sited my village here, just as the Chumash did." It is easy to understand why Chumash settlements occurred here. The site offered everything necessary for comfortable living -- shellfish, kelp and other seaweeds, wetland plants, seeds, acorns, berries, roots, bulbs, trout, and numerous species of game. There were freshwater sources and rocky shorelines, as well as sandy beaches from which to launch tomols. There were dry, grassy terraces on which to site coastal villages, and upland areas for retreat and seasonal hunting and gathering. There was access to major trails routed along the coastline, out over the water, and deep into the mountains along Arroyo Sequit.

When vegetation allows passage, a hike up Arroyo Sequit is a walk into another world, a riparian environment that remains essentially unchanged since Chumash times. Sycamore canopies shade the stream course as it narrows and steepens in the enclosing canyon walls. In his book, "Happy Days in Southern California" (1898), Frederick Rindge describes a canyon very much like Arroyo Sequit where a stone grotto looks out into a canopy of sycamores. He talks of following the Sequit to its headwaters, of the shaded pools where trout lived, of fern banks, and the enclosing canyon walls. He felt compelled to describe how much this world of the canyon meant to him, speaking referentially of mineral springs, waterfalls, and the "brooks" whose gifts brought refreshment and life to grasses, trees, and the human soul, whose laughter made poets sing.

The canyons along the Malibu coast have a long association with mystery and intrigue. Much of Leo Carrillo State Beach was once part of the Topanga Sumo Sequit land grant held by the Tapia family. Local community folklore has it that a treasure hoard of gold and silver coin was buried on the rancho, variously dug up, transported, or smuggled from coastal canyons. Infamous bandits used to to hide and make their camps there. Frederick Rindge himself claimed to know where the desperate bandit Nicolas leaped over a precipice rather than be taken alive by Mexicans who had trailed him to his mountain hideaway.

In "The California I Love" (1961), Leo Carrillo recalls a story about his great-great-grandfather Jose Raimundo Carrillo, a mighty hunter, who in searching for mountain lions up Malibu Sequit Canyon, had a fateful meeting with La Lechuza, the Owl Woman -- the cave dweller of California. Carrillo said, "My father told me this story at the cave itself in Malibu Sequit Canyon when I was very small.... I think perhaps her spirit has blessed me, as she in person blessed my great-great-grandfather. At least I like to believe so and to express my thanks, too, to La Lechuza." Leo Carrillo, who served fourteen years as a state Park and Recreation

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Commissioner, was always aware that his ancestors were connected in spirit to many of the lands he helped "set aside forever for the people of California." He believed that he was fulfilling what his ancestors would express to him if they could. When the lands around the mouth of Arroyo Sequit Canyon became part of the State Park System, they were named in honor of Leo Carrillo and his family. The work of this General Plan, financed, for the most part, from a generous gift from his estate, is dedicated to Leo Carrillo, now very much a part of the spirit of this place.

The Department shall define and execute a program of management to perpetuate the unit's declared values, and provide recreational facilities and interpretation that make these values available in a manner consistent with their perpetuation.

Spirit of place refers to qualities that make a place memorable - that create impressions we take away with us. Tangible features we see, hear, smell, and feel all imprint our senses whether we are aware of it or not. Together, they make up the intangible spirit that we recall.

Each person brings his or her own expectations and preferences to a place, with senses focused upon particular aspects of the surroundings, so each takes away his or her private version of the spirit of the place. However, we as park planners must assume that some elements of the park experience are shared and universal. This allows us to assess the spirit of place of the state parks with which we deal and to strive to enhance aspects of those places that will most enrich a spirit conducive to a high quality park experience.

Mackerricher State Park is long and narrow, flanked by the ocean for its entire length. Because of this, all of the park is influenced by the sea and the restless, moisture-laden air it engenders. The ocean is visible from many parts of the park. Sea smells fill our lungs. On the other hand, the park embraces a wide variety of landforms and vegetation types, each with its own particular potential for inspiring feelings and memories. People are plentiful in some parts of the park's landscape during the busy season, while they are few in others.

Consequently, the park actually has many spirits of place. Design criteria for developments proposed in the Facilities Element are intended to assure that park improvements will respect and foster the spirit of place of each of the many varied areas within the park.

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MacKerricher SP #146

12/1975 - Statement of Purpose

The purpose of MacKerricher State Park is to make available to the public, in an essentially natural condition forever, an outstanding segment of Mendocino County coastline centered at Cleone Lake and embracing significant coastal pine forest, coastal tide pool areas, sand dunes extending north to the mouth of Ten Mile River, the Inglenook Fen, and related scenic and natural values. Recreational resources exist in relation to the prime resources and should be developed accordingly.

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Mailliard Redwoods SR #149

10/2000 - General Plan Policy Committee

The purpose of Mailliard Redwoods State Reserve, in Mendocino County, is to preserve and protect, in an essentially natural condition, the coast redwood forest and associated wildlife habitat which occurs along the Garcia River and adjacent watersheds.

California State Parks will preserve, protect, restore, interpret and manage the unit's natural, cultural and aesthetic features and values, making them available to the public for their educational, inspirational and recreational benefits.

"The Spirit of this Place" - (page 6)

West and ahead of the Mendocino coast, the sturdy white column of the Point Arena lighthouse rises atop a great eroded peninsula of earth and rock, whose cliffs stand fifty, now eighty feet above the tides. Along the foot of this great horizontal plateau flow the waters of the Garcia River out to the sea, and a great ocean beach runs north unbroken, mile lengthening into mile. Beginning in a desert of dunes and sand plains of the wind and water's making, the shore curves inland toward the continent in a long arc, stretching north some four miles to the mouth of Alder Creek, where the earth cliff, rising again, is cut briefly by the narrow gorge of the creek, then standing as a rugged vertical wall across the face of the Mendocino coastline.

In this broad and shallow basin, north from the lighthouse and south of the Alder Creek bluffs, the land fronting the sea is a progress of long undulation, now level, then hollows and mounded hills here and there, revealing the barren moorland character of the country just above. Cliff and dune, the plain of the ocean and the far, bright horizon, meadowland and marsh and ancient moor, lagoon, lake, forest, grassland, beach and stream: this is Manchester State Park. Sun and moon set in the sea, the arched sky has an ocean vastness, the fog appears over the ocean, now blankets the earth, the surf flings its spray against the sun. Journeying birds alight here and fly away again, all unseen; schools of great fish move beneath the waves, and the deer graze in the quiet of the dusk. The flux and reflux of oceans, the souging of wind, the pilgrimages of people to the sea - all these are part of its beauty and mystery.

The sea is the counterpoint to the land - both contrast and complement. The vast horizontality

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and seeming restlessness of the sea are in sharp contrast to the verticality and stolid bulwark of the cliffs and the Point Arena lighthouse - yet there is complement in the horizontal profile of the land, in the undulating waves of dune and grassland and the coursing of water in streams and through marsh. The meeting of land and sea and sky speaks of variation on a theme of generous open space: the spaciousness of undeveloped land, the endless sea disappearing into the horizon, the immense expanse of sky.

This vast and primitive landscape offers vital hope for the future. Here at the terrestrial fringe, the complexity and fragility of life are demonstrated forcefully. The beauty of the landscape and the magnetism of the sea, whether consciously felt or not, modify the objectives and response of all who come to the park seeking recreation. The resulting activities, though often dissimilar, derive their essential meaning from the inherent qualities of these resources. Today, annual visitation of Manchester State Park is exceeding 40,000, even though much of the land is unavailable for active recreation. Since it is one of the windiest and foggiest spots on the Mendocino coast, it is apparently something more than simply a place to play.

Manchester State Park can best be described perhaps as a relict of the aboriginal California coast, serving as a vital and convenient outlet to a people becoming more and more pressured by the urgency of today. To many, it represents a last frontier - so near to urban populations, yet remaining relatively unviolated by the symbols of contemporary life. The primitiveness of this vast horizontal landscape, inextricably connected to the sea, contains few reminders of the urgency of today, and in this condition, it serves the present as usefully as any piece of land could.

The purpose of Manresa State Beach, established in 1948, is to provide for the people forever for their enlightenment, inspiration and aesthetic and recreational enjoyment an area of beach and coastal bluff together with the outstanding natural values of this coastline.

The function of the California Department of Parks and Recreation is to manage the resources as composite whole; preserving them in accordance with sound, ecological principle, to interpret these resources to the people and to provide services and facilities consistent with the preservation of natural, scenic and ecological features while offering maximum recreational opportunities.

07/1959 - Statement of Purpose

To make available to the public by day use 9,500 front feet of sandy recreation beach.

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Marconi Conference Center SHP #213

10/1992 - General Plan

The purpose of Marconi is to make available to the people for their edification and enjoyment, and preserve for future generations, the outstanding historic features associated with the development of modern communication technology, the surrounding landscape and natural values, and to make conference facilities available to the people for their use and enjoyment. The Department shall define and execute a program of management to perpetuate the unit's declared values, and provide recreational facilities and historical interpretation that makes these values available in a manner consistent with their perpetuation.

Marconi contains special and unique attributes which produce its own "spirit of place." This spirit is based on development of the Marconi wireless telecommunication station and the rural setting. The key ingredients which produce these attributes are based on:

- * Aspects of the natural environment such as land form and topography, vegetation, climate, and the presence of water.
- * Cultural expressions such as significant buildings and structures which complement the landscape, social history, and human activities.
- * the sensory experience, primarily visual, which results from the interaction of culture and landscape.

A strong sense of place is based on such items as:

- * Architectural style
- * Climate
- * Natural Setting
- * Use of local materials
- * Craftsmanship
- * Sensitivity in the siting of important buildings and structures

The hotel is a strong visual landmark that helps identify Marconi within the local community. The hotel and the other historic buildings provide the area with a connection to the past. High-quality detail permeates the historic building, and contributes to overall quality and spirit. There is an image that was created with the relationship between forest and historic structures. There is a strong sense of enclosure, wind protection, and a special "forest island" created by the forest/vegetation. Marconi's uniqueness is also derived from its close proximity and sloping aspect to Tomales Bay. The preservation of Tomales Bay and its landforms, the surrounding open space, and agricultural lands are important to maintaining the spirit and character of Marconi. The care used in the site planning of the historic buildings, the organization of functions, and the concern for visual orientation still permeates one's experience at Marconi.

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Marconi Conference Center SHP #213

The diversity of the site, which includes forest, grassland, sloping terrain, knolls, and the panoramic vistas from the site, provides an opportunity for visitors and conferees to experience nature in a relaxed setting. The historic tower footing is a very important link to the past and to the spirit of the place.

The Shore Units complex is a positive, well-designed element, which, is in harmony with the site. The temporary metal buildings, trailers, and utility structures provide a strong visual disruption to the setting and spirit of place. (page 79)

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Marin Headlands SP #242

01/1965 - Declaration of Purpose

The purpose of Marin Headlands State park is to provide an opportunity for the people to enjoy and appreciate the outstanding scenic, natural, and historic values of the majestic headlands of the Marin County coast, extending northward from the Golden Gate, including the wildlife and wildflower displays and the remains of the historic military fortifications and providing unique outdoor recreational experiences adjacent to a major population center.

The function of the Division of Beaches and Parks at Marin Headlands State Park is to preserve and protect the natural and historic values; to provide appropriate interpretive services and facilities; and to make available recreational and other public service facilities consistent with the declared purpose of the park, as may be necessary for the full enjoyment of the park by the people.

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Marina Dunes NP #932

08/1987 - General Plan

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Marina SB #479

08/1987 - General Plan

These include Burney Falls and the lower canyon of Burney Creek; the scenic mountain and forest landscapes typical of the southern Cascade Mountain Range, the riparian habitats associated with Burney Creek and Lake Britton, the seasonally wet meadows the variety of forest, Sierra mixed-coniferous forest, black oak woodlands and Oregon white oak woodlands; the geology, plant and animal life; the significant historical and archaeological resources; and the scientific values therein.

The natural, scenic, and cultural resources associated with these lands are entrusted to the Department of Parks and Recreation for stewardship in perpetuity. The department's mission is to protect these resources and prescribe and implement a program of resource management to perpetuate the park's declared values. The department will provide opportunities for safe, enjoyable, and educational experiences in a primarily natural setting. This will be accomplished through well-planned facilities, programs, visitor services, and maintenance. Park management shall regulate visitor uses as necessary to keep them compatible with the perpetuation of park resources.

06/1997 - Vision Statement

Aesthetic Resources and Spirit of Place:

The plateau upon which the park lies was once a tranquil place. The Pit River, almost too distant to be heard, sighed from the depths of its canyon. Burney Canyon resounded with the roar of the falls and the cheerful gush of the creek. Forests of conifers and oaks interspersed with lush meadows clothed the plateau, the scattered hills, and the slopes of the canyons. The area abounded with a wide variety of animals. The people who were fortunate enough to live in this place before Euro-American settlers came revered the falls as sacred.

Changes to this scene began slowly but escalated during the twentieth century. After settlement of the Pacific Coast and the birth of California, this remote part of the state retained its isolation. Well into the twentieth century, paved roads were rare, and the sounds of construction were fleeting. The park area still remains far from the lights of the city, and clear nights reveal thousands of stars and the Milky Way, now hidden from most urban dwellers.

Within the last few decades, more and more vacationers have sought the solitude of northeastern California and come to the park. Now, the park's developed areas reflect its

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popularity. Buildings, roads, and parking lots dominate the landscape near the falls. Pedestrians, bicycles, and automobiles crowd park roads. Damming the Pit River has created a bright lake with a swim beach jammed with adults and children when the weather is warm. Motorboats, waterskiers, and jet skiers roar by. Scents of campfires and automobile omissions sometimes vie for the attention of visitors who have come to breathe the fresh and vibrant air. A major highway now carries traffic, including thunderous trucks, to within 800 feet of the falls, flooding the surrounding picnic grounds, visitor center, and campfire center with noise during most of the day and early evening. On a busy day, the falls' roar is audible only at the canyon rim.

It is during the quieter parts of the year that some of the ancient tranquility returns. However, asphalt and compacted earth remain, although sometimes hidden beneath a soothing blanket of snow.

Spirit of place refers to qualities that imprint upon peoples' senses and make a place memorable. What people see, hear, smell, and feel create an intangible spirit they can later recall. However, people bring their own expectations and preferences to a place, with senses focused upon particular aspects of their surroundings. Therefore, each visitor takes away his or her private version of the sense of a place.

Department visitor surveys reveal that some visitors felt their time at the park was tainted by the placement of facilities and the level of development. Some comments were: "Too overrated, too overcrowded."; "There is a lot of motor traffic through campground to lake - cars driving up and back." Others offered suggestions such as: "Move parking lot next to falls to area of picnic tables - that would improve natural area next to falls that has been made very sterile."

On the other hand, most visitors tended to overlook such intrusions, perhaps because they didn't arrive expecting a primarily natural experience. Thus visitor surveys also contain many enthusiastic comments: "You have a gorgeous park here!" "This is the closest we'll get to heaven here on earth. We'll be back next year"; "Beautiful escape." Some families return year after year: "We have been coming here for the past 10 years and we LOVE the park."

However, general planning for this park has been based on the assumptions that there are negative aspects of the park experience that a majority of the visitors share, either consciously or subconsciously. Therefore, this plan has been prepared with the intention of improving and enhancing the park's spirit of place. In the future, visitors should be better able to experience the park's inherent natural qualities with less impact from built intrusions, especially near the falls. Unhindered by distracting developments, individuals will approach the falls with a restored

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sense of anticipation, arrival, and wonder at the great roar and grandeur of the plunging white water - a primal force that has shaped this land.

The Purpose of McArthur-Burney Falls Memorial State Park is to preserve, in its natural relationship of forest and stream, Burney Falls, together with Burney Creek above the falls extending to include the springs which furnish the summer flows for the fall, and extending downstream to include the nearby shores of Lake Britton. The area supports an outstanding ponderosa pine forest which shall be managed in the vicinity of the falls to provide the essential natural and aesthetic background for the falls themselves. Other portions of the forest may be managed to provide overnight and day use recreational activities for people visiting the fall. Lake Britton offers recreational opportunities, including boating, swimming, fishing, and sightseeing, and these recreational resources will be managed to provide secondary recreational experiences for park visitors. Significant archeological and historical features existing within the park will be protected and interpreted for public enjoyment.

To make available to the public by overnight and day use 485 acres of forested land and reservoir frontage and to protect and perpetuate the beauty of Burney Falls and an example of a rapidly rising steam typical of lava country.

(undated) - Interpretive Perspectus - Division Approved

The primary objective and obligation of the Department of Parks and Recreation to the McArthur Burney Falls Memorial State Park is to protect, preserve and interpret the Burney Falls and its headwaters within the park boundaries in a manner stipulated in the conveyance of the pioneer McArthur family in the State of California.

The Department of Parks and Recreation must furnish those functions, facilities and services which will accomplish the above and provide forever experiences of maximum inspirational and recreational values for the people of the state through the appropriate use and enjoyment of the outstanding resources of the park.

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McConnell SRA #310

03/1976 - Interpretive Perspectives - Division Approved

The purpose of McConnell State Recreation Area is to make possible the full utilization of the recreational opportunities available along this portion of the Merced River, together with consideration for the native riparian scene and all scientific, scenic, historic and natural resources of the area.

The function of the Department of Parks and Recreation at McConnell State Recreation Area is to design, construct, operate, and maintain public recreational facilities of such scope and in such manner as to realize the maximum recreational potential of the area; and to protect and enhance the resources of the area in accordance with its declared purpose.

McGrath Lake and the Santa Clara River mouth are recognized for their outstanding natural features and shall be managed to protect and perpetuate the river and seashore lake (sic) ecosystems.

The purpose of McGrath State Beach is to preserve a significant coastal area, while at the same time providing the public with an opportunity for camping and other outdoor activities. The purpose of McGrath State Beach is to protect as an outdoor recreational resource the ocean beach with related uplands immediately downcoast from the mouth of the Santa Clara River in Ventura County. McGrath Lake, a small body of fresh or brackish water, is included in the upland area of the State Beach. Developments shall not impair the scenic integrity of the State Beach. Developments may be made to provide for the enhancement of recreational opportunities related to the public enjoyment of the sandy beach and associated values.

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Mendocino Headlands SP #158

03/1976 - General Development Plan

The primary purpose of Mendocino Headlands State Park is to make available to the people its outstanding scenic, natural, educational, and historical values, existing in a relatively small area, which extends from the mouth of Big River upcoast to Russian Gulch and includes the estuary of Big River. The scenic values are as spectacular as any found on the California coast, and include both the quaintness of the historic Mendocino City and the boldness of the wave-sculptured Mendocino Headlands.

Mendocino Headlands State Park is established to provide protection, for public enjoyment forever, for the natural and scenic environment extending from the mouth of Big River upcoast and embracing the shoreline feature known as Mendocino Headlands. 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Mendocino Woodlands SP #159

10/2000 - General Plan Policy Committee

The purpose of Mendocino Woodlands State Park, in Mendocino County, is to preserve and protect the unit's historic facilities and natural features, and to make available to the public the types of public recreation and educational experiences for which the historic Mendocino Woodlands Outdoor Center was originally created. This large-scale complex of overnight accommodations and associated support facilities, designated as a National Historic Landmark, developed in the late 1930s by the federal Works Progress Administration and the Civilian Conservation Corps, exhibits a high state of preservation and extraordinary historic integrity. The function of the Division of Beaches and Parks at Millerton Lake State Recreation Area is to prescribe and execute a program which provides appropriate recreational opportunities and facilities for full use and enjoyment of the unit, without impairment of its resources, in accordance with the declared purpose.

To provide overnight, day use, boating, swimming and aquatic facilities to enable the public to enjoy the recreation opportunity provided by Millerton Lake.

Within the redwood grove & riparian habitat areas, restoration and preservation are primary considerations, with interpretation about wildland resources and ecological processes sharing that primary role. Of secondary consideration within the redwood grove and riparian areas, and of primary consideration in all other areas of the Park, will be the preservation and appropriate uses of CCC-era structures.

10/1999 - Sense of Place

The spiritual essence of California's grant redwoods is captured within the boundaries of Pfeiffer Big Sur State Park, very near the limit of the trees' natural southernmost distribution. As the centerpiece State Park of the magnificent Big Sur coast, the Park serves a wider statewide role as one of the key showcases for these venerable, giant redwoods, displaying the magnificence and beauty that nature has bestowed upon them. Although only a relatively few old growth redwoods survive among the forest of maturing second growth trees, there exists the feeling of an ancient forest standing guard over the meandering Big Sur River.

As the excitement and crowds of summer thin to a few off-season campers, a quietness pervades the venerable redwood groves. The rustle of leaves, the chatter of a squirrel, the chance glance of a deer or much rarer mountain lion, especially along the back country trails, mark the beginning of renewal for the Park. Winter's coming rains wash clean the river, adding wrinkles of time to the hillsides and cliffs as the rushing waters push a new supply of much needed sand towards the Pacific Ocean. Water soaks the ground quenching summer's thirst as the roots of redwoods and oaks, alders and sycamores drink deep in anticipation of the coming spring's growth. As winter's rains wane, the cycle of life begins anew as wildflowers burst forth spreading their future descendents across the broad mountains and narrow valleys. Seeds fall from trees and delicate new growth springs from the tips of branches and from the

brown coat of mother earth. Then its time for the returning crowds of summer and for the cycle to repeat.

Nearly 100 years have passed since human intervention began to have any significant impacts on the annual cycle of renewal here. Now, each year, as increasing numbers of visitors come to enjoy the beauty and the solitude, nature struggles to recover from their unintentional impacts. With the popularity of State Parks continuing to increase, as does the population of California and her citizens' demands for quality recreational experiences, original management strategies no longer can protect the valuable natural and cultural resources of Pfeiffer Big Sur State Park.

This distinctive geographic landmark, with a blufftop providing panoramic vistas of the Pacific Ocean coastline, has been designated as a State Historic Landmark. The unit, which provides significant regional open space value, contains a wide ecological diversity, including rare native coastal scrub and sand dune plant communities, as well as a pristine intertidal area frequented by marine mammals. This unit contains a significant Chumash Indian site.

California State Parks will preserve, protect, restore, interpret and manage the unit's natural, scientific, cultural, aesthetic and scenic resources, features and values, making them available to the public for their educational, inspirational and recreational benefits.

Point Dume State Beach is established to make possible the public outdoor recreational enjoyment of the sandy beach with related uplands and the headlands of Point Dume in Los Angeles County. 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Point Lobos Ranch #441

The purpose of the Point Lobos Ranch property, in Monterey County, is to preserve and protect an extremely scenic portion of the northern Big Sur Coast, an area offering spectacular views of Carmel Bay and the Pacific Ocean coastline. The property contains one of the world's largest native Monterey Pine forests, examples of the rare Gowen cypress and areas of the rare maritime chaparral plant community. The property and surrounding public lands provide mountain lion habitat, and its San Jose Creek provides steelhead spawning grounds. The property contains significant Native American archaeological sites and an early twentieth century complex of ranch buildings.

California State Parks will preserve, protect, interpret and manage the property's natural, cultural, aesthetic and scenic resources, features and values, making them available to the public for their educational, inspirational and recreational benefits.

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Point Lobos SR #449

05/1979 - General Plan

The purpose of Point Lobos State Reserve is to perpetuate forever, for public enlightenment, inspiration and esthetic enjoyment, an area of unique natural beauty and ecological significance including the Monterey cypress-covered headlands, unique Gowen cypress pygmy forests, Monterey pine forests, meadows and prairies, rocky shorelines, sandy beaches, and ecologically unique underwater areas, together with the related natural, scenic, and cultural values and the aquatic and terrestrial flora and fauna in an essentially pristine state.

California Departments of Parks and Recreation and Fish and Game are to manage the aquatic and terrestrial resources as a composite whole, preserving the primitive character of the reserve in accordance with sound ecological principles to interpret these resources for the people, and to provide necessary services and compatible facilities consistent with the preservation of scenic and ecologic values for the enjoyment of the reserve by visitors.

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Point Montara Light Station #282

The purpose of the Point Montara Light Station property, in San Mateo County, is to preserve and protect an 1885 Lighthouse and its Victorian-era support buildings, listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Situated atop a rugged Pacific Ocean coastal bluff, and located close to a major metropolitan area, the property offers splendid views and a point from which to see the seasonal migration of the California gray whale.

California State Parks will preserve, protect, restore, interpret and manage the property's cultural, natural, aesthetic and scenic resources, features and values, making them available to the public for their educational, inspirational and recreational benefits.

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Point Mugu SP #573

02/1977 - Interpretive Perspectives - Proposal Only

The purpose of Point Mugu State Park is to preserve, interpret and develop for public use and enjoyment, the unique natural blending of canyon, grassland, mountain and seacoast resources. Included in this natural blending are the prime resource values of La Jolla Valley natural preserve, Chumash Indian archaeological sites and scenic vistas.

At Point Mugu State Park, the function of the Department of Parks and Recreation is to protect the resources and values of the area, to prescribe and execute appropriate programs which will provide opportunities for public use and enjoyment in accordance with the declaration of purpose for this unit.

Outstanding natural values include the sidehill dunes ecosystem, and the nearby Point Mugu Lagoon. Outstanding cultural values include the village sites in La Jolla Valley and "Shuwalashu", which have been almost totally destroyed.

The primary purpose of La Jolla Valley Natural Preserve is to preserve the valley ecosystem in total, with special consideration to the grassland ecosystem and the associated archeological sites. Of prime interest is the preservation of a representative example of the Stipa tall grass prairie community which existed in California prior to the impact of civilization.

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The chaparral and coastal scrub areas may be used by the public for uses relating to the enjoyment of the coastal and mountain scenes, providing such uses do not adversely alter the natural appearance of the area, impair nesting habitats of birds, or otherwise alter the general ecological integrity of these ecosystems.

The oak woodlands of Serrano and Wood canyons deserve special attention as to their natural features and ecological importance in sustaining and providing refuge for animal species. The sycamore savanna of Big Sycamore Canyon is the finest example of this ecosystem found anywhere within the State Park System. This ecosystem will require special attention; much of it should be preserved.

The cultural values of Point Mugu State Park, where they are currently known (see Resource Inventory report) or discovered in the future, will be fully protected and interpreted for public enlightenment and enjoyment. There are many archeological sites in Point Mugu State Park; the prehistoric resources are of great scientific value. Archeological sites are not to be disturbed except for approved archeological research, which is the key to understanding and interpreting the past cultures of Point Mugu.

03/1976 - Interpretive Perspectus - Division Approved

The purpose of Point Mugu State Park is to perpetuate for public use and enjoyment the scenic values, natural qualities, and archeological evidences which are found in the area embraced by the watersheds of La Jolla Creek and Big Sycamore Creek, including its tributaries; and the ocean beach from the headlands of Big Sycamore Creek to the vicinity of Mugu Lagoon. The ocean beaches may be used for daytime or overnight ocean-oriented recreation.

The purpose of Point Mugu State Park is to perpetuate for public use and enjoyment the scenic values, natural qualities, and archeological evidences within are found in the area embraced by the watersheds of La Jolla Creek and Big Sycamore Creek, including its tributaries; and the ocean beach from the headlands of Big Sycamore Creek to the vicinity of Mugu Lagoon.

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Point Sal SB #535

Point Sal State Beach was established to protect natural coastline values, and to provide public access to the sandy beach cove. Future public use of the area shall be restricted to activities that relate well to the ocean orientation of the unit and do not impair the scenic or natural values. Due to constraints on roadway access and the sensitivity of the landscape, facilities shall be limited to those needed for visitor access, health, and safety. These facilities present a continuum of maritime and military history at Point Sur. The significant aspects of this history and the Park's unique natural, cultural, and scenic resources will be preserved, protected, and interpreted for visitor enjoyment and education.

The men are gone, the houses have vanished, even the name of the place is forgotten. In no other land, in modern times, have towns so absolutely died and disappeared as in the old mining regions of California."
Mark Twain

Twain's quote brings forth a series of images in one's mind of the people and places of an era long gone. These images personify what it was like to live in a Gold Rush-era town, and the end many of these towns met.

Shasta was one such town. With the discovery of gold, miners of all races and cultures poured into the area in the spring of 1849. There were fortunes to be made in the creeks and the rivers in the hills of Northern California. The town started as a camp where miners got together for

socializing, eating, drinking (usually exuberantly), gambling, and the business of living. Soon, permanent structures emerged, and the camp became a thriving town.

The gold in the nearby hills soon became scarce. The miners moved further back into the mountains, and smaller towns sprang up in the surrounding areas. Doctors, lawyers, and businessmen who came to the town as miners soon learned that there was more money to be made by selling goods and services to the other miners than by mining. The town evolved into a wholesale and retail center, a political center, and a distribution center for goods for the surrounding area. Shasta was the terminus of the wagon road, and the head of "Whoa' Navigation." Shasta became known as the Queen City of the Northern Mines. Business was booming. The future looked bright; the railroad was coming north.

But the railroad stopped short of Shasta, and went instead to a place called Poverty Flat, near the Sacramento River. The town slowly lost its prominence as businesses left, and people eventually followed the railroad. In 1888, after 40 years, the county seat moved to the new town of Redding. Shasta did not suffer quite as final a fate as those towns recollected by Mark Twain. Slowly, Shasta declined and fell into ruins. Today, all that remains are a few structures that somehow managed to survive, ruins, and the headstones of the people who lived and died there.

Shasta was alive as any town of its era, but through the influences of a changing world, the town all but died. Shasta is the story of the people, the evolution of technology, and the changing attitudes of an era. This is the spirit of place of Shasta.

Away from the intense beach activity, visitors walk the Little River road now covered by a dense canopy of alders, Douglas firs, hemlocks, redwoods, and softened by fern canyon walls. Beyond the roadway, the trail climbs out of the canyon into a different landscape where the view is not through the forest but over the top of the aged dwarfed trees.

For some who venture through the Little River Canyon, in search of the "little giants", the excitement and adventure is deminished (sic) upon their arrival to (sic) the pygmy forest. At the end of the 3.5 mile trail is the park's "back door", with the service road access and view of the parking lot reducing the sense of discovery. Approaching the boardwalk, one may try to forget the man-made intrusions surrounding the site and look for the pygmy cypress; with some skepticism for the truth of their age, they begin to feel their strength and understand their sensitivity. The excitement of nature returns.

In this seemingly wilderness area, rich with abundant plant and animal life, a season occurs when the interest of nature gives way to the migration of abalone divers and underwater enthusiast. The park is then transformed from nature's campground into a hunting village, when after a successful hunt, divers pound the abalone generating rhythmic sounds that echo throughout the campground. One wonders if this modern day use doesn't in some way mimic its pre-historic use by Native Americans. This signals that time of year when Van Damme is occupied predominantly by recreation divers - wet suits, air tanks, and rubber boats dominating

the scene. The diver's presence in the offshore underwater habitat and the park, overwhelms unsuspecting campers, and beach users who are unfamiliar with this seasonal sport. While the focus is offshore in the marine environment, the inland areas provide refuge for non-divers and a place of rest and gathering for groups and individuals sharing this common interest. As the crescent subsides and the hunters migrate elsewhere, the village returns to normal, the park awakens and the spirit of nature emerges once again, until the next hunting season.

The purpose of Westport-Union Landing State Beach is to make possible the public use and enjoyment of the Pacific Ocean shoreline in the vicinity of Westport on the Mendocino County coast. Recreational activities which are appropriate to the public enjoyment of the ocean shore with its beaches may be provided within the State Beach. Recreational facilities for the enhancement of public enjoyment for this State Beach may be installed on Beach or upland areas to the extent that they do not interfere with the beach resources or impair the quality or integrity of the upland natural and scenic values.

To make available for day use and fishing 17,310 feet of scenic ocean frontage of northern California coastline.

The purpose of the proposed Natural Preserve at the mouth of Wilder Creek is to protect The wetlands and coastal strand and one of only two nesting sites in Santa Cruz County still used by the snowy plover.

Public use and enjoyment of the park is to be encouraged in the limits established by the state park classification and resource sensitivities.

Cultivated agricultural lands in the unit represent an important aspect of the area's history and are recognized as significant to the community and the state in terms of their present productivity. However, retention of this land in cultivated agriculture is considered of secondary importance to that of providing appropriate recreational opportunities and of protecting any outstanding cultural or natural resources.

The purpose of the proposed Natural Preserve at the mouth of Wilder Creek is to protect the wetlands and coastal strand and one of only two nesting sites in Santa Cruz County still used by the snowy plover.

10/1979 - Interpretive Perspectus - Division Approved

The purpose of Wilder Ranch State Park is to protect and perpetuate the cultural and natural resources, including historic features, geologic and soil phenomena and natural biotic communities, and related recreational values of this part of the coastline and coastal mountain region. Public use and enjoyment of the park is encouraged subject to limits established by the state park classification, resource sensitivities, and available staffing.

The purpose of the cultural preserve proposed for the ranch building area will be to protect historic resources while promoting public understanding and enjoyment. The California State Dairy Museum will also be housed in this area.

The primary purpose of the proposed natural preserve at the mouth of Wilder Creek will be to protect and perpetuate the coastal beach and wetland resources there. Public use in an adjacent to the preserve will be restricted so as not to disturb existing dune vegetation and other plant and animal resources.

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Wilder Ranch SP #456

Due to the visibility of most of the park lands from State Highway 1, protection of existing views will be a major consideration in the management and development of the unit.

Cultivated agricultural lands within the unit have been recognized as significant to the community and the state, and shall be retained to the greatest extent feasible, while still allowing for public access and appropriate recreational activities in the vicinity.

04/1975 - Interpretive Perspectives - Proposal Only

The purpose of the Wilder Ranch State park is to provide the public enlightenment, inspiration, aesthetic and recreational enjoyment and a greater awareness of our cultural heritage in an area of unique natural beauty.

The function of the California Department of Parks and Recreation is to manage the natural and cultural resources as a composite whole; preserving them in accordance with sound ecological and historical preservation principles, to interpret these resources to the people and to provide services and facilities consistent with the preservation of natural, scenic, historical and ecological features.

11/1986 - General Development Plan or General Plan

The purpose of Topanga and Will Rogers State Beaches is to provide opportunities for the public to see, use, and enjoy for recreational purposes the sandy beaches, intertidal rocky shorelines, and the associated terrace areas. All beach recreational activities which are consistent with the perpetuation of the beaches and related natural and cultural resources are appropriate for these State Beaches.

The implementation of management policies and the location of construction improvements shall be accomplished in a manner which enhances public opportunities for ocean beach-oriented recreation in a high quality environment, provides a visual compatibility with the scenic qualities of the units, and preserves natural and/or cultural resources present.

12/1975 - Statement of Purpose

Will Rogers State Beach is established to make possible the public use and enjoyment of sandy ocean beach in Los Angeles County from the Santa Monica city limits upcoast to the Los Angeles city limits. All beach recreation activities which are appropriate to the enhancement of public enjoyment for this ocean beach area may be developed and operated within the State Beach. Every effort will be made to minimize any impairment of the scenic or natural integrity of the State Beach by the installation of recreational facilities. Every effort will be made to insure (sic) optimum public use of this State Beach on a year-round basis.

To make available for day use this heavily used recreation beach and its 9,715 ocean front feet.

03/1992 - General Plan

The department shall preserve and interpret the Will Rogers home, its collections, related historic structures, and the historic landscapes in the park, and shall endeavor to make these areas accessible to the public for its enjoyment and appreciation. The primary purpose of Will Rogers State Historic Park is as a nationally significant memorial to Will Rogers, and for perpetuation of the uses and values he sought to create at his home above the city in the Santa Monica Mountains.

The department shall preserve, manage, and restore natural areas in the park for their intrinsic natural and scenic values, and to complement the historic landscape, both which were important to Will Rogers. The department shall endeavor to provide historically accurate recreation opportunities appropriate to this historic park, emphasizing those activities that were historically important on the ranch, such as roping, polo playing, and horsemanship, and others that are ancillary to historic interpretation, such as picnicking, tennis, and hiking. Through interpretive tours, and special events, the department shall promote an understanding of Will Rogers' contributions to American history, folklife, and the national character.

03/1992 - Spirit of Place Statement

This description is intended to portray the spirit of Will Rogers SHP. It identifies intrinsic values that pertain to the essential and inherent nature of the place - aspects that are not necessarily set only by law, science, or economics. It identifies the site's uniqueness, that which sets it apart from all other places. Spirit of place identifies the distinctive characteristics that the site possesses; that is, the set of attributes that determine this uniqueness of its landscape, architecture, and history.

What it is (Existing Condition)

Today, Will Rogers' ranch lies in the midst of the community of Pacific Palisades, next to Beverly Hills, an established residential neighborhood with very high real estate values.

Open space and quietness at the park are significant aspects on weekdays. There is still today a feeling of being on a private ranch.

Weekends often bring crowded conditions, and the park takes on an athletic field feeling, with soccer games and crowded picnic areas. People today are trading quietness for access to open space, even though it is crowded.

What it Was (Historic Condition)

The kind of place that the ranch was when Will Rogers occupied this property has been greatly

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detailed by DPR park staff, historians, and landscape architects in the Cultural Resources Element of this plan.

To briefly describe what kind of place the ranch was, the following paragraphs illustrate Rogers' relationship to his Santa Monica ranch house, the equestrian facilities, and the landscape.

Will Rogers' personality was one of homespun simplicity - casual, informal, and unpretentious. His career as a witty speaker and humorous writer was a combination of his country-style background, his entertaining roping skills, and his political point-of-view speeches. His hobbies included horseback riding, roping, and relaxation and enjoyment. Will Rogers' tremendous popularity led to his desire for the privacy of a family ranch.

The Rogers' (sic) entertained their friends in a country fashion that Rogers enjoyed the most; casual dress, outdoor cooking, and chats with his friends. The house interior was casual, built with exposed wooden beams and rustic country furniture. As Rogers acquired gifts and mementos related to his statesmanship, he decorated the ranch house with Native American blankets, ropes, and saddles. The whole ranch image was one of tranquility - spacious green lawns with white rail fencing, and ponies trotting here and there.

Will Rogers created this place. This was the Rogers family's primary residence, and it was conceived and designed by Rogers for himself and his family. The wholeness of the place, including landscape, building sites, and architecture, represents conscious choices made by Rogers. What he liked and the way he liked to live is manifested in the place, and the spirit of the place survives to the extent the wholeness of the place is preserved.

What is different

The historic spirit of place is markedly changed upon entering the ranch. The long, curving driveway, ending with a spectacular view across grassy open space to the ranch house, is no longer used. Now, the entry is still off Sunset Boulevard, but it brings visitors past residences in from behind the ranch house into a parking area that is located on the old entrance driveway, and is on the grassy, open area. Visitors lose that grand promenade entrance experience one gets by using the old entry road.

Other changes are more subtle, but in increments of small details, the feeling of historic pastoral presence is diminished. Some of these small changes include:

- * The historic garage is now used as a visitor center.
- * the historic guest house is now used as park offices.
- * The polo field is used as an ordinary athletic field, and there is the resultant non-historic

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overcrowding, noise, etc.

- * Sarah's Point is no longer a green pasture.
- * Cars are parked where there used to be part of a small golf course and entrance road.
- * Huge, mature eucalyptus trees surround the area instead of the smaller, newly planted ones.
- * the once clear, distant views over Santa Monica and the ocean is (sic) now sometimes obscured by smog.
- * There is a lack of paint trim on the ranch house and the foundation plantings around it have changed.
- * There has been structural failure of some of the historic rock walls and ditches.
- * Much of the white-rail hose fencing has been removed over the years.

What It Should Be

The spirit of place should give the feeling of going back in time and of visiting Will Rogers' ranch as one of his guests. The presence of historic features, structures, and activities should predominate the scenery. The area needs to be as free as possible from modern-day cars, offices, and stored park equipment used for maintenance.

The spirit should be of a homey family ranch, peaceful, and at the same time active, especially with the equestrian activities that Will Rogers loved. One should almost believe that the Rogers family is still here, and that Rogers himself could be that person demonstrating roping, or could be one of those horsemen playing polo.

The spirit of place should leave one with the definite impression that this place is a memorial to Will Rogers.

The purpose of Will Rogers State Historic Park is to perpetuate for public use and enjoyment as a memorial, historical monument, and public park, the Los Angeles home of Will Rogers with its grounds, environs, and memorabilia, dedicated to the memory of this distinguished American humorist, actor, and citizen.

The function of the Division of Beaches and Parks at Will Rogers State Historic Park is to

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prescribe and execute a program for the protection, maintenance, use, and interpretation of the Will Rogers ranch house with its grounds, environs, and memorabilia so as best to present the era and a tradition of Will Rogers as a fitting memorial to him; making in perpetuity a reasonable charge for admission to the ranch house, recognizing that this ranch encompasses a fine example of the coastal chaparral of the central Santa Monica Mountains, and giving due recognition to all related historical, natural, and appropriate recreational values to be found in the area.

07/1959 - Statement of Purpose

To preserve and display the home of Will Rogers.

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William B. Ide Adobe SHP #128

01/1990 - General Plan

The purpose of William B. Ide Adobe State Historic Park is to interpret the role of William B. Ide as one of the leaders of the California Republic, as well as his role in the activities of the Bear Flag Revolt. It is also the purpose of this unit to interpret the role of William B. Ide as a pioneer of Colusi (sic) County, later to become Tehama County in 1856, and to interpret the life and times of the pioneers of Tehama county. The restored historic adobe situated at the western terminus of the ferry that crossed the Sacramento River shall be the core of these interpretive programs. (note: page 27 of the General Plan gives the text of an earlier Declaration of Purpose, whose date or source is not provided.)

12/1975 - Statement of Purpose

The purpose of William B. Ide State Historic Park is to commemorate W. B. Ide for his part as "General" in the Bear Flag Revolt and "President" for the brief California Republic, as an example of an Early California citizen who conscientiously devoted much of his life to public duty while California was a State through making available the Ide Adobe as an example of northern California adobe architecture.

The function of the Department of Parks and Recreation at William B. Ide Adobe State Historic Park is to preserve, restore, furnish, and interpret the Ide Adobe in such a way as best to fulfill the declared purpose of the unit.

01/1975 - Interpretive Perspectus - Division Approved

The purpose of William B. Ide Adobe State Historic Park is to memorialize William B. Ide and his importance in early California history and to make available to the public the site of Ide's Crossing.

The function of the Department of Parks and Recreation at William B. Ide Adobe State Historic Park is to plan and execute a program which will interpret William B. Ide and the site of Ide's Crossing; and to furnish other such facilities and public services, consistent with the purpose of the Park as may be necessary for the full enjoyment of the Park by people.

To display and interpret for public enjoyment the home of Pioneer William B. Ide.

William Randolph Hearst Memorial SB #486

10/2000 - General Plan Policy Committee

The purpose of William Randolph Hearst Memorial State Beach, in San Luis Obispo County, is to preserve and protect an outstandingly scenic cove on the Pacific Ocean shoreline, situated in the southern portion of the Monterey Bay National Marine Sanctuary. With its high-quality marine environment, the unit provides opportunities for viewing a variety of marine mammals, including the southern sea otter, harbor seal, and migrating humpback and California gray whales. The safe harbor, the sandy beach, and the pier provide a range of appropriate outdoor recreation opportunities.

California State Parks will preserve, protect, restore, interpret and manage the unit's natural, cultural, aesthetic and scenic resources, features and values, making them available to the public for their educational, inspirational and recreational benefits.

12/1975 - Statement of Purpose

The purpose of William Randolph Hearst Memorial State Beach is to make possible the public use and enjoyment of the Pacific Ocean shoreline in the vicinity of the community of San Simeon on the San Luis Obispo County coastline. All public outdoor recreational activities which are appropriate to the enjoyment of the ocean beach and which do not impair the scenic or natural integrity of the beach or of the related uplands may be developed and operated within the State Beach.

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Willowbrook SRA #506

10/1978 - General Development Plan

The development of recreation facilities at Willowbrook Park will serve to preserve a valuable urban open space resource. This preservation will serve to meet the needs of a heavily urbanized area of the State. In development of these resources, a sensitive approach to design should incorporate the social, economic, and recreational needs of the city dweller. Since Willowbrook Park represents the last remaining valuable open space of any significant size in the south-central Los Angeles area, the retention of its open space resources should be emphasized in the overall development plan.

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Unit/Property Name and Unit Number

Woodland Opera House SHP #327

03/1980 - General Plan

The purpose of Woodland Opera House State Historic Park is to provide visitors with a facility in which they can learn about and enjoy activities associated with professional and amateur theatrical productions, symphonies, public staged events, ballets, operas, and related cultural activities, as well as public functions such as town meetings and political, civic, and professional conferences that are harmonic (sic) with similar historic events held in the building in the past.

The opera house should be a monument to theatrical history. A regular museum exhibit is to be provided, but more importantly, production of plays and other events in the restored theater will occur. In essence, the past will live again as part of the present.

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Woodson Bridge NP #122

12/1975 - Statement of Purpose

There is established within Woodson Bridge State Recreation Area the Woodson Bridge Natural Preserve embracing an outstanding area of Sacramento River riparian vegetation lying on the right bank of the river, across the river and northwest from the main portion of the Recreation Area. The purpose of the Natural Preserve is to provide for the protection of the natural riverbank within its limits, along with the ecosystems in the riparian zone. All values within the Natural Preserve are perpetuated for public use and enjoyment in an essentially natural condition. Only those uses may be permitted which are consistent with the perpetuation of the natural scenic and ecological values, and only trails may be provided for public access. Any cultural values which may exist within the Natural Preserve are to be afforded full protection.

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Woodson Bridge SRA #129

04/1966 - Master Plan Review Committee

The purpose of Woodson Bridge State Recreation Area is to perpetuate the non-urban recreational opportunities offered by the Sacramento River and its margins in the vicinity of Deer Creek and Woodson Bridge in southern Tehama County, so that the recreational, scenic, scientific, and historic resources of the area and its environs may be enjoyed by the people as a part of the overall Park System program for recreation along this river in the Sacramento Valley.

The function of the Division of Beaches and Parks at Woodson Bridge State Recreation Area is to prescribe and execute a program for the management, protection, enhancement, and perpetuation of the varied resources of the unit in consonance with the total Park System program for recreation along the Sacramento River, and provide such facilities and services, consistent with the declared purpose, as are necessary for the enjoyment of the area by the people.

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Unit/Property Name and Unit Number

Zmudowski SB #450

08/1987 - General Plan

The purpose of Zmudowski State Beach is to protect, perpetuate, and make available to the people, for their benefit and enjoyment forever, the scenic, natural, cultural, and recreational resources of the ocean beach and the adjacent coastal dunes.

The function of the California Department of Parks and Recreation at Zmudowski State Beach shall be to preserve and protect the coastal dunes and the related native vegetation and to make opportunities for ocean beach-oriented recreation available to the public.

12/1975 - Statement of Purpose

The purpose of Zmudowski State Beach is to make possible the public use and enjoyment of the Pacific Ocean beach and shoreline between the mouth of the Salinas River and the mouth of Elkhorn Sough in Monterey County. All public outdoor recreational activities which are appropriate to the enjoyment of the ocean beach with its scenic and recreational resources may be developed and operated within this State Beach. Facilities may not impair the scenic and natural integrity of the ocean beach.

01/1974 - Interpretive Perspectus - Proposal Only

The purpose of Zmudowski State Beach, established in 1950, is to provide, for the people forever, for their recreation, inspiration and aesthetic enjoyment, a combination of beach, dune and river delta together with the indigenous flora and fauna in an essentially undeveloped state.

The function of the California Department of Parks and Recreation is to manage the resources as a composite whole, preserving the character of the area in accordance with sound ecological principals, to interpret the resources to the people and to develop necessary services and facilities compatible with the preservation of the scenic and natural resources while providing optimum consistent recreational opportunities.

07/1959 - Statement of Purpose

To make available for day use 8,524 feet of ocean frontage with a sandy beach.

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
